At a Special Meeting of the Wellesley Tp. Council Held at Linwood on Monday Important Business was Discussed.

A special meeting of the Wellesley Tp. Council was held at Linwood on Monday, the 14th day of May, 1906, in Friedman's Hall, at 1.30 p.m.

All the members were present, A. B. Robertson presiding.

Messrs. Robertson and Huehn were appointed to at once investigate the road running north from Linwood to the Peel boundary, in compliance with the request of the delegation from Linwood and vicinity, who addressed the Council on the 9th inst.

Council adjourned until 3 p.m.

They reassembled at 3.15 p.m. All members present, the Reeve in the chair.

Messrs. Fish, McCormick, Mamer, Berlet, Hayes, and others, addressed the Council along the same lines as at Crosshill and solicited a sufficient grant to put the road in question in a fair and good condition for the public traffic. After thoroughly considering and discussing all sides of this request, upon motion of A. Heipel, seconded by H. N. Huehn, it was decided that a sum of money not exceeding \$600 be expended by a committee composed of the Reeve, A. P. Dammeier and A. Gibbons in the vicinity of Linwood, as in their judgment they see fit.

Upon motion of A. P. Dammeier, seconded by H. H. Huehn, a sum not exceeding \$200 will be expended by a committee composed of the Reeve, Messrs. Huehn and Dammeier on Martinson's flats, as they in their judgment see fit.

The Council will co-operate with the Peel Council in seeing that the Guelph and Goderich R. R. Co. do not have a dangerous crossing for the public at the Wallenstein hill.

A by-law to provide for drainage work in the Township of Wellesley in the County of Waterloo, and for borrowing on the credit of the municipality the sum of \$3,747.42, the portion to be contributed by said municipality for completing the same, was read a first and second time.

Quite a number of complaints were laid before the Council re the building of the water tank at Linwood by the Guelph and Goderich R. R. Co., the distance from the public highway to the tank being only a couple of rods, and being considered very dangerous to the public traffic. The Clerk was instructed to notify the Railroad Commissioners and ask them to kindly investigate this matter thoroughly and see that the said railroad company build their tank at least 200 feet from the public highway.

Mr. Gibbons was instructed to at once notify the foreman of the tank builders of the steps taken by the Council.

The Council adjourned to meet again the first Monday in June, at the Tp. Hall, Crosshill, at 10 a. m., Court of Revision to be held same day at 1.30 p.m.

RAILROAD TALK IN WELLESLEY

County Councillor DeBus Notes Great Progress in Northern Township.

County Councillor DeBus was a visitor to Wellesley T'p this week, and gives an account of his trip, which will be of interest to Berlinites, as well as Wellesleyites.

Wellesley Township has for years been looked upon by the people of Waterloo County as the one township that stood alone, in a great many ways. Whenever Wellesley Township was spoken of in County Council, there was always something said about the poor land, its bad roads, no railroad, poverty-stricken farmers, and from fifteen to twenty-five miles to market.

Something Doing.

A few days ago I had the pleasure of taking my first trip through the township of Wellesley. From Heidelberg to St. Clements the roads were in splendid condition, the farms were looking fine, with grain of all kinds, and probably as fine, a farming country as can be found anywhere in Ontario. After leaving St. Clements behind some miles, I met the township pathmaster at work with a road grader, improving the road. A short chat with that important official and I began to learn something about Wellesley Township.

Good Roads.

The pathmaster informed me that all the leading highways into Linwood were going to be improved. Said he: "You know Wellesley Township is going to have a railroad and Linwood is going to be our shipping place—and we want good roads to Linwood."

On resuming the drive I observed that a great many additions were being built to barns, old barns were being reshingled, and everywhere one looked it seemed as if things were being straightened up.

The Only Sheep.

Wellesley Township is about the one township in the county where nearly every other farmer raises sheep. Along the roadway there are sheep grazing or trying to get in the shade of a sheltering rail fence. Herds of thirty and forty were counted at one farm, and I wondered how it was that lambs and mutton sausage were so scarce in the County Town. Cattle and horses are to be seen on every farm.

Linwood was reached in time for dinner, and spring lamb was in evidence—but not for long. Having some spare time, I called upon my old friend, ex-County Councillor R. Y. Fish, whom I found in the best of health and full of

Railroad Talk.

"For forty years and more our people have been looking for some way of getting to a market without travelling over 20 miles of probably the worst roads (in the spring and fall of the year) to be found anywhere. Wellesley Township," said Mr. Fish, "is coming to the front fast. When our railway is completed, and with our highways improved, we will be as good (if not the best) township in the county."

Want Berlin.

"What we do want, though, is an electric line to the County Town. You know that we still look to Berlin as our County Town, and the place where we can dispose of our produce at good prices." Mr. Fish informed me that there were no vacant houses in Linwood, and that a lot of new houses were being built, and that land had increased in value since the coming of a railroad into the township.

Listowel Branch.

On coming back to the hotel I had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Graham, C.E., who has charge of the engineering party which is giving the final survey to Listowel. Mr. Graham informed me that the road would be running to Listowel by December 1st this year. The two spans on the Wallenstein bridge have been placed, and the bridge will be finished this week. He also informed me that the road to Listowel was as level as a prairie, and that tenders for the grading would be let shortly.

Berlin; Get Busy.

That it is up to Berlin to get an electric road to Linwood, up through Erbsville, touching Heidelberg, St. Clements and Hawtsville, we all know, but are we going to be satisfied with that?

Must Act at Once.

That Berlin is expecting the Preston & Berlin Electric road to go north is sure, but the objective point is not certain. Berlin wants Linwood without fail, as that will give us all Wellesley Township, the products of 66,000 acres of as fine land as can be found anywhere.
