New Rink for Linwood

Through the enterprise of one of its citizens Linwood is to have one of the most commodious and up-to-date rinks in Western Ontario. It is being erected by Mrs. Casper Boegel and will cost about \$5,000. The structure will be 90x190 feet, and is expected to be completed in a month. Suitable quarters in the front of the rink will be provided for a band stand and dressing rooms and reserved seats will also be located in the front portion of the building. Messrs Forler of Philipsburg and Jos. Ament of Linwood have the contract for the erection of the building.

The rink will be a decided acquisition to the town and will serve as a place of recreation during the winter months, where skating, hockey and curling may be enjoyed.

Now that Linwood is to have a new rink it is expected that the place will develop a hockey team which will be able to successfully cope with those on larger places.
