there was a level crossing and the children are daily exposed to danger. He was willing to do anything in order to have this question finally settled.

Mr. R. Y. Fish referred to the fact that the same question was discussed twelve years ago when a board of arbitrators decided there should only be one school in the section. It would be a fatal mistake to divide the section.

Messrs. Beggs and Crawford, both of Linwood, also spoke, the former quoting figures to prove there were not enough pupils for two schools in the section, while the latter stated that where the school is at present located it has been necessary for him to keep a horse for twelve years to drive his children to school. He believed it would be more beneficial to

the educational interests of the section if two schools were erected instead of one.

Councillor Wegenast, in presenting the resolution to appoint a committee of the Council, expressed the opinion that three independent members of the Council could solve the question with as much satisfaction and less expense than a board of arbitrators.

Grant for Militia.

Lt.-Col. Oliver, in his address to the Council regarding the grant which had been turned down at the last meeting, stated that the 29th Regiment was in better shape than it had been for some years. It is composed of companies in Preston, Hespeler, Elmira, New Hamburg and four in Galt. Work is being started in a few days on the new armories to be erected in Galt. The expenses in connection with the up-keep of a regiment are ~~not~~ ^{heavy}. The officers have to provide their own equipment, and their personal expenses amount to \$60 to \$80 a year. The expenses of keeping up the band are also heavy. Military training of the young men is a good thing for them and ought to be encouraged. It makes them better citizens. In cases of emergency it is better to have a body of trained men to defend the country than untrained men. Nearly every county in the province grants an amount equivalent to 25 cents per day while in camp toward the up-keep of their respective regiments. The Regiment has been receiving \$240 from the county and he asked that this be increased to \$300. By encouraging the militia the county is promoting law and order. When the police of the country cannot preserve law and order the militia steps in and if necessary the whole British Empire is available. In concluding Col. Oliver put in a word for the Grey's Squadron; which, he said, is a worthy unit and deserving of support.

The Council arose again to allow the committees to complete their work.

COUNTY COUNCIL APPOINTS COMMITTEE TO REPORT ON LINWOOD SCHOOL MATTER

Deputations Were Heard Regarding the
Prolonged Controversy Over the Div-
ision of School Section No. 4

GRANT REQUESTED FOR 29TH REGT

The various committees of the County Council, which were in session on Tuesday afternoon, rose about three o'clock for the purpose of hearing several deputations which desired to address the members of the Council. Lt.-Col. Oliver of the 29th Regiment, Galt, made an urgent plea for financial assistance for the regiment, after which the Council listened to the arguments of representatives of the parties on both sides of the prolonged controversy regarding the division of School Section No. 4, at Linwood.

In connection with the Linwood controversy a petition had been presented by residents of the section asking that the County Council appoint a board of arbitrators to decide the question. The Act provides that the County Judge, the School

Inspector and one to be appointed shall deal with differences arising out of controversies of this nature. After hearing the addresses of the Linwood deputations Councillors Wegenast and Yates were the movers of a resolution that instead of appointing a board of arbitrators that the Council appoint a committee of the Council, composed of Messrs. Cassels, Willmot Tp., Hurst, Woolwich Tp. and Shaw, Waterloo Tp., to investigate the question and report at the next meeting of the Council. This was carried practically unanimously.

Mr. J. A. Scellen, Berlin, appeared on behalf of the Linwood ratepayers who are opposed to the dividing of the School Section. He reviewed the controversy from the beginning, referring to the fact that the present school which is three-quarters of a mile outside of the village, had been condemned by the Inspector, and unless a new school is erected the government grant will be withheld. The entire question had been presented to the Wellesley Tp. Council, the members of which decided that the new school should be erected on its present site. The supporters of the two school idea then appeared to the County Council to appoint a Board of Arbitration. This action is deemed unnecessary and expensive. The ratepayers whom he represented also objected to the School Inspector being a member of the board of arbitration on the ground that he has expressed himself as being strongly in favor of two schools being erected. It was the opinion of the majority of the ratepayers that the Township Council was competent to judge in this matter.

Dr. McEachern addressed the Council and stated that he favored the dividing of the school section. There were at present 83 children of school age in the section and with the increase of population during the next ten years there would be enough children for two two-room schools. He claimed that it was a hardship for the Linwood children to walk three-quarters of a mile to school every day, and it was difficult to secure competent teachers. In addition

RECRUITING MEETING IN LINWOOD SUCCESSFUL AND ENTHUSIASTIC

Strong Appeals Made in Addresses by Messrs. L. McBrine, W. G. Weichel, M.P., A. G. McAvity and Col. H. Martin—Two Enlisted.

In a hall packed to the doors by an enthusiastically patriotic audience the North Waterloo Citizens' Central Recruiting Committee succeeded at Linwood Friday evening in enlisting two recruits and lining up a dozen or more prospects whose enlistment will be only a matter of days. The meeting met with a splendid response from the residents of the village. Speeches were made by L. McBrine, W. G. Weichel, M.P., A. G. McAvity and Col. Martin of the 118th Battalion. Capt. Walters M.H.O. of the battalion was present and passed the two men enlisted. A delightful patriotic musical programme was rendered by the Dominion Tire Company Quartette and Mr. Douglas MacKay.

Chairman L. McBrine was the first speaker and in a short address pointed out the duty of every young man in respect to enlisting for the defence of the Empire. He graphically sketched the conditions existing in Belgium, Serbia, and Poland as a result of German fiendishness and appealed to the young men of Linwood to come forward to avenge the Lusitania and the murder of Edith Cavell.

Mr. McBrine was followed by W. G. Weichel M.P. Mr. Weichel spoke at some length giving a clear, outline of the reasons why Britain is engaged in this conflict and pointing out the salient facts of German political history which are responsible for the present conflict. He put the question of "Why Should it be the duty of Canadians to take an active part in this war," and answered it by declaring that since the citizens of Canada have accepted the liberties and advantages of British citizenship they also accepted the responsibilities of that citizenship and should therefore as a matter of duty respond to the call of the Empire in this crisis.

"I have been told," declared Mr. Weichel, "that I would meet with a certain antagonism if I broached the subject of enlisting to people of German extraction. I don't believe there is any such antagonism in this country. My father and mother were born in Germany. I am of German extraction but I have never seen Germany. I owe nothing whatever to Germany but I am proud to-night of my citizenship in the British Empire."

"Some of us here in Canada have heard it remarked that Germany can never set a hostile foot upon this Dominion because of the strength of the Monroe Doctrine of the United States. This they say is our protection against a German invasion. Let me say to you to-night that the policy of the Monroe Doctrine has nothing to do with German occupation of Canada and I declare that while Canadians have the fighting blood of their fathers in their veins they will not take shelter behind the Monroe Doctrine in this war."

A. G. McAvity followed Mr. Weichel on the platform. He opened his remarks by reading to the young men the King's message calling for more men to uphold the cause of the Empire. Mr. McAvity stated that the reason he has not gone to the front is simply because he has been required to remain at his post to oversee the making of ammunition. He declared: "I feel that I have done my part in this capacity and I intend to be at the front before the spring." In concluding Mr. McAvity declared that the men in shops and offices and those engaged in tilling the soil should leave their responsibilities up-

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on the shoulders of those who are incapable of military service and join the ranks of those who are wearing the uniform of the King.

Col. Martin was the last speaker of the evening. His speech was typical of a military man. He appealed to the patriotism of the young men of military age to join the colors with a view of aiding the young men already at the front to put down the military despotism that has enslaved the German people and has menaced

the peace and liberty of the world. He asked the mothers in the audience to show courage and strength for the duty of encouraging their sons to enlist. He stated that the three or four million men at present in the ranks of Kitchener's army are only the fringe of the Empire. There are millions he declared, available for service and it is to them that the appeal must be made.

The meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem after which two young men came forward and enlisted. About twelve others crowded about the recruiting table with a view of getting further information.

Capt. McNeil, assisted by the able committee at Linwood, will remain at his post in the village until about 30 men are secured. Those present from Berlin were: Carl Kranz, W.G. Cleghorn, L. McBrine, August Lang, A. G. McAvity, E. W. Clement and Doctor J. J. Walters.
