Premier King Welcomed.

Linwood was favored by a visit from the premier of Canada, Rt. Hon. W. L. M. King last Thursday, Sept. 14th while he was on a two-day tour of Kitchener and Waterloo County in general. Linwood happened to be the last before returning to Kitchener, arriving here from Wellesley about 3.45 in a heavy down-pour of rain. It was to be the official opening of the new pavement and complete arrangements had been made for a record celebration and crowd in the old burg, a reception committee having been appointed to welcome the premier and party. The stores and private dwellings were gaily decorated for the occasion although the outside decorations were completely ruined by the rain. The premier was welcomed by nearly a thousand people and about 100 school children who marched about a block with Mr. H. J. Helm in charge and sang, "O Canada." Mr. King was then presented with a beautiful bouquet by two of the girls, Louise Schummer and Mary Kruetz-wiser, acknowledging them with kisses much to the amusement of the crowd.

His speech was surely enjoyed by the large crowd, all classes alike, his main point being a plea for unity and good will throughout the whole country and Dominion. He then recalled his old days in Waterloo county, mentioning his associates, Messrs. Nick Asmussen, M.P.P. and W. D. Euler, M. P., who were all pals 40 years ago. During his speech he said, "I have opened envelope doors and bottles, but this is the first time I have the honor of opening a street, so I think the

best way of opening it would be to gather around and resolve to always serve our home and country." He then complimented the village on building the new pavement. Talking about unity the premier said he thought there was no country in Canada better equipped for good schools, good churches and good homes, these three things he said being surely the foundations of life. He took a deep interest in the many school children and said no higher compliment could be given him than to have so many people standing out in the heavy rain.

He then shook hands and received the compliments of about 500 people.

He was breaking and baling it alone with a gasoline engine and this day had only been running about fifteen minutes when the engine back-fired. Then when he heard the flames crack above him he was lucky to save himself. He only saved a few bales of tow which were lying just outside the doors and also rescued his car just in time. He had only shipped two truck-loads out of his whole crop and the tow burned is valued at \$5000 and machinery & seed at \$2000. The whole loss is estimated at \$7000, of course with no insurance whatever. The loss to Mr. Deckert will be about \$2000 covered by insurance.
