One of Linwood's oldest and most highly respected citizens passed away on Friday at noon, in the person of Mrs. Mary Hayes, at the ripe old age of 82 years. Mrs. Hayes had been ill for the past number of years losing her memory completely and has been out of the house very little during the last four years. However the past twelve months her daughters, Misses Carrie and Nellie Hayes noticed that she was gradually becoming weaker and her death was therefore not at all unexpected. Miss Nellie Hayes, who is an experienced nurse, having spent most of her professional life in Detroit, and also a year overseas during the war, has been constantly beside her mother the past five months. The deceased was born in the old Irish City of Tipperary, Ireland in 1841, and came to Canada when but seven years of age with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. O'Grady, who settled down at Richmond Hill just east of Toronto. A few years later the family transferred to a farm five miles east of Listowel.
