Killed by Train.

A sad accident happened on Thursday morning when Mr. Jacob Kipfer was hit by the Toronto-Goderich C.P.R. train shortly after eleven o'clock on the ninth line crossing near the Mornington boundary. Dr. McEachren was summoned immediately by the section men who were not far away but nothing could be done as he was severely wounded about the head, and passed away about three hours after he was taken to his home. The horse was killed instantly.

A jury which was impanelled to investigate the circumstances of the accident visited the scene the same evening and will hear the evidence here on Wednesday.

Train Crew Exonerated

The adjourned inquest into the death of Jacob Kieffer who was killed on the 8th Concession of Wellesley on Thursday, March 12, was resumed in Schnurr's Hall, Linwood, on Wednesday morning before Coroner Wagner.

Crown Attorney Bowlby and Provincial Constable Oliver of Kitchener were present.

The train crew were examined. Engineer Pagnell swore that he whistled before reaching the crossing and that the bell was continuously ringing. Mrs. Joseph Schmidt, Mrs. Jacob Kieffer, Mr. Gideon Wagner and Mr. Gideon Phair were also sworn.

None remembered having heard the whistle but would not swear that it was not blown.

The jury brought in a verdict declaring the death of Mr. Kieffer due to accident and exonerated the train crew from all blame.
