PASSES AWAY AT LINWOOD

R. Y. Fish, Former Waterloo Mayor and Esteemed County Resident, Dies. Aged 96 Years.

One of the county's most progressive and estimable citizens passed away at Linwood on Thursday last in the person of R. Y. Fish, a former mayor of Waterloo, where he was well known. His death occurred following a two weeks' illness of pneumonia. He had attained the advanced age of 96 years.

The late Mr. Fish, while a resident of Waterloo, identified himself with various activities having for their object the welfare of the town and showed himself to be a public-spirited citizen. He was one of Waterloo's leading residents prior to his removal to Linwood and was engaged in the mercantile business.

After his removal to Linwood he continued in the store business. He also continued to take a special interest in all public matters. He was a staunch Liberal and a zealous supporter of the party. He was an accomplished speaker and frequently delivered addresses in behalf of the party which he supported.

Surviving him are two sons, Bert of Detroit and Robert at home; also two brothers, Oliver of Colorado and John of Otterville, and one sister, Miss Elizabeth, at home.

SPECAL LAR FIRE HEAR LINWOOD

Large Barn Owned by Fred Ayerst Burned to Ground. 61 Head Livestock Saved.

LANTERN EXPLOSION LOSS ABOUT \$8750

Another disastrous fife occurred last Friday night about 8.30, o'clock when the large bank barn and straw shed, one of the largest in the county, belonging to Fred Ayerst, situated near Linwood, or what is better known as the George Sayder homestead, was totally destroyed. The blaze, a spectacular one, could be seen for miles, and brought hundreds of people to the scene. The blaze was caused when a lantern exploded. The livestock was saved by the quick action of Mr. Ayerst and other helpers. The loss on barn and contents is estimated at \$8750 which is covered by \$6700 insurance.

Mr. Ayerst was almost finished with the chores at the barn when

the lantern, which he had with him, suddenly exploded. In # few moments the whole structure was in flames. Mr. Ayerst realized that nothing could be done to control the fire and at once began to save the livestock. There were 53 head of cattle and eight horses in the stables and by quick work on the part of Mr. Ayerst and neighbors the livestock was saved. After the horses and cattle were all safely out of the barn attention was given to prevent the spread of the fire to the adjacent buildings. Some of the implements were saved but a quantity of hay, grain, clover seed, 2 wagons and other implements were burned.

Big Tractor Saved.

One thing clearly demonstrated during the fire was the unusual strength of a Clydesdale horse which was hitched to a large International tractor in the driving shed. The terrified animal succeeded in fulling the machine through deep mud and out of range of the fire.

Loss Estimated at \$8750.

The total loss is estimated at \$8750, partly covered by insurance with the North Waterloo Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance Company. The barn, a total loss, was covered by \$5,000 insurance and the implements, grain and hay \$1750. About 65 tons hay, 100 bushels alsike and timothy seed and other grain and many of the implements were burned. Mr. J. H. Woods, manager of the N. W. Farmer's Mutual Fire Insurance Co., visited the scene of the fire on Monday and adjusted the loss.

Will Rebuild.

Mr. Ayerst intends to rebuild a modern new barn, work on which will be started as soon as possible. It will cost about \$7000 to replace the old structure.
