PIONEER DIES IN 97TH YEAR

**Alex. Adams, Esteemed Macton
Resident, Called by Death.
Mrs. J. B. Jantzi Died
Jan. 14th.**

Alexander Adam, of Macton, and one of the oldest pioneers of the district, passed away at the home of his grandson, Alexander Cooper of the 14th. concession of Wellesley. He died on the farm on which he first settled when coming from Glasgow, Scotland, where he was born 96 years ago. He had never experienced sickness until the brief illness, which caused his death. About 70 years ago he was married to Janet Stewart, who predeceased him in 1921, shortly after they had celebrated the diamond jubilee of their wedding. Mr. Adam was a successful farmer and was held in high regard in the community. He could tell of many incidents of pioneer life, of hardships and conditions unknown to the present generation. He is survived by five sons and two daughters—Alexander, of Doon; Walter, of Macton; William, of Kitchener; Thomas, of Peel; Jacob, of Kindersley, Sask. Mrs. John Cooper of Hespeler and Mrs. John Small of Elmira. Mrs. Jacob Cooper Hespeler predeceased him several years. He is also survived by eighteen grandchildren and eight great grandchildren. The funeral took place from his late residence on Monday afternoon, Jan. 14th, to Elmira cemetery.

Services were conducted at the house by Rev. B. Eyre, of Glenallen United Church and Rev. M. Stewart

of Knox United Church, Linwood. Rev. Dr. McEoy of Elmira conducted the services at the grave. Many floral tributes were sent by sympathizing friends. Pall bearers were four sons and two grandsons, Alexander, Walter, William and Thomas Adam, and John and Alexander Cooper.

DEATH OF MR. G. SCHLEUTER

Passed Away on Friday in His
59th Year.—Other

After a comparatively short illness the death occurred on Friday, Jan. 25th of Mr. Christian Schleuter a prominent resident of Linwood in his 59th year. Only a week ago the late Mr. Schleuter contracted influenza. Born in Linwood the late Mr. Schleuter spent his entire life there and was widely known in the surrounding district. Fire Destroys Two Barns Near Linwood

Aaron Bender and Conrad Hahn Suffer Loss Estimated at \$12,000.—Caused by Lantern Explosion.

One of the most spectacular fires in years took place two miles west of Linwood on Friday night when fire caused by a lantern explosion levelled four buildings, two barns and two driving sheds, causing damages estimated at \$12,000. The loss is partially covered by insurance. While no stock fell prey to the flames, considerable grain, hay and implements were destroyed.

Aaron Bender was feeding stock in the barn across the road from his house when the lantern exploded, spreading fire in all directions. A few minutes later the barn was a mass of flame which spread rapidly to the driving shed, burning both buildings to the ground.

The high wind carried sparks and burning embers to the roof of Conrad Hahn's barn, situated over 100 yards away, and this building together with the driving shed was also quickly reduced to a pile of burning timbers.

Helpers were successful in removing the stock from both barns, with the result that ~~no animals were~~ burned.

A strange coincidence is the fact that the residence on the Hahn farm was burned to the ground about ten years ago. While the Bender barn was practically empty, there was a considerable amount of grain stored in the Hahn barn and this too is a total loss.

While it is still too soon after the disastrous fire for either farmer to estimate his loss accurately, it is estimated that neither barn could be rebuilt for \$5,000. The driving sheds were also substantial buildings. The loss has been conservatively estimated at \$12,000 though it may later be placed as high as \$15,000. The buildings on both farms were partially covered by insurance, said to be about \$6300.
