**Death of Rev. J. Sylvester McGoe.**

Following an illness for the past few years the death occurred at the Sacred Heart Church Rectory of Rev. J. Sylvester McGoe, parish priest, at Paris, on Wednesday morning, Sept. 28. The late Father McGoe was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John McGoe of near Linwood. He received his early education at Macton Separate School and later completed his College course at St. Jerome's Kitchener, and made his theological studies at the Grand Seminary, Montreal. He was ordained to the Holy Priesthood on December 23, 1913, and celebrated his first High Mass in his native parish, St. Joseph's Church, Macton on Christmas Day. His first appointment was as assistant at St. Patrick's Church, Hamilton, where he labored a number of years. He was later appointed as pastor to Markdale, Ont., where he accomplished noble work in the vineyard of our Lord. During those thirteen years he erected the church at the Mission Durham, new sheds at the Mission Glenely, besides the many improvements at Markdale. He was also pastor a Kenilworth for a short time and later appointed to Paris. After his death on Wednesday morning his corpse was waked at the priest's house until Friday afternoon when it was borne to the parish Church, where it lay in state with a body guard of men in attendance during the night, until the funeral mass on Saturday morning. A Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by His Excellency Right Reverend John T. McNally, D.D., Bishop of Hamilton, assisted by Very Reverend Dean G. Cassidy as Assistant Priest, Rev. C. Brohman and Rev. F. Coughlin, C.S.S.R., as Deacons of Honour, Rev. T. Doyle and Rev. W. Goodrow as Deacon and Subdeacon respectively, of the Mass. Rev. A. O'Brien and Rev. W. Hawkins as Masters of Ceremonies. Rev. Dean Cassidy preached a very befitting sermon on the dignity of the priesthood. The clergy present for the funeral mass included Rt. Rev. Monsignor W. Gehl, Vicar.
