### Aged Resident Is Dead.

Mrs. Michael Stemmler, nee Catherine Gatschene, a pioneer resident of Wellesley township, passed away at her home here on March 23rd. She was born in St. Clements, Dec. 14th, 1864, and was in her 70th year. She had been ill for the past year. She and her husband celebrated their golden wedding on Sept. 21, 1932. Mr. and Mrs. Stemmler lived on a farm near Dorking for forty-one years, and since retiring have lived in Linwood. She was a member of the League of the Sacred Heart, St. Joseph's Union and the Altar Society of the Linwood R. C. Church.

She is survived by her aged husband and six children, Xystus, Riverside, Ont., (Ida) Mrs. J. B. Meyer, Berwlyn, Alta., (Matilda) Mrs. Eugene Helm, Waterloo, Charles, Detroit, Mich., Anne, R.N., at home, Joseph, S.J., of the Jesuit Seminary, Toronto. Six sisters and one brother, Mrs. V. Voll, Shaunanon, Sask., Mrs. Wm. Illerbrun, Sask., Mary Gatschene, Los Angeles, Calif., Mrs. Jos. Stemmler, Hesson, Mrs. Welte, St. Paul, Minn., Mrs. Steckman, St. Paul, Minn., and John Gatschene of Los Angeles. Seven children and three brothers predeceased her. There are 21 grandchildren surviving.

The funeral was held on Monday morning to St. Mary's Church, Hesson, where a solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated. Rev. V. J. Morgan of Linwood was celebrant, Rev. Joseph Monaghan, S.J., of St. Stanislaus Novitiate, Guelph, as Deacon; Rev. Wm. Becker, St. Clements, Sub Deacon, with Rev. E. Weber of Hesson present in the sanctuary. The youngest son, Joseph M. Stemmler, S.J., of the Jesuit Seminary of Philosophy, acted as Master of Ceremonies. In his oration, Father Monaghan, S. J., paid splendid tribute to her humility, her devotion to her family, her church and her God—adding that he felt anything he might say would be inadequate since the large funeral and the crowded church itself was proof of her sterling qualities, but from his short acquaintance with the deceased and members of her immediate family, he knew her to be a model mother and a devout Catholic.

Six close friends of the family acted as pallbearers. There were no floral tributes because of special request, but the spiritual bouquets were numerous.

Mr. Berlet conducted a successful tailoring establishment in Linwood until he disposed of the business and became associated with the Robe and Clothing Company, Kitchener.
