Aged Resident Is Dead.

Mrs. Michael Stemmler, nee Catherine Gatschene, a pioneer resident of Wellesley township, passed away at her home here on March 23rd. She was born in St. Clements, Dec. 14th, 1864, and was in her 70th year. She had been ill for the past year. She and her husband celebrated their golden wedding on Sept. 21, 1932. Mr. and Mrs. Stemmler lived on a farm near Dorking for forty-one years, and since retiring have lived in Linwood. She was a member of the League of the Sacred Heart, St. Joseph's Union and the Altar Society of the Linwood R. C. Church.

She is survived by her aged husband and six children, Xystus, Riverside, Ont., (Ida) Mrs. J. B. Meyer, Berwyn, Alta., (Matilda) Mrs. Eugene Helm, Waterloo, Charles, Detroit, Mich., Anne, R.N., at home, Joseph, S.J., of the Jesuit Seminary, Toronto. Six sisters and one brother, Mrs. V. Voll, Shaunanon, Sask., Mrs. Wm. Illerbrun, Sask., Mary Gatschene, Los Angeles, Calif., Mrs. Jos. Stemmler, Hesson, Mrs. Welte, St. Paul, Minn., Mrs. Steckman, St. Paul, Minn., and John Gatschene of Los Angeles. Seven children and three brothers predeceased her. There are 21 grandchildren surviving.

The funeral was held on Monday morning to St. Mary's Church, Hesson, where a solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated. Rev. V. J. Morgan of Linwood was celebrant, Rev. Joseph Monaghan, S.J., of St. Stanislaus Novitiate, Guelph, as Deacon; Rev. Wm. Becker, St. Clements, Sub Deacon, with Rev. E. Weber of Hesson present in the sanctuary. The youngest son, Joseph M. Stemmler, S.J., of the Jesuit Seminary of Philosophy, acted as Master of Ceremonies. In his oration, Father Monaghan, S.J., paid splendid tribute to her humility, her devotion to her family, her church and her God—adding that he felt anything he might say would be inadequate since the large funeral and the crowded church itself was proof of her sterling qualities, but from his short acquaintance with the deceased and members of her immediate family, he knew her to be a model mother and a devout Catholic.

Six close friends of the family acted as pallbearers. There were no floral tributes because of special request, but the spiritual bouquets were numerous.

JOHN L. McKAY, A LEADING CITIZEN DIES; AGED 81 YEARS

Took Active Part in Civic Affairs
During Lifetime.—In Black-
smithing Business.

There passed away at Linwood on Wednesday, Jan. 18, John L. McKay, one of the oldest and most highly esteemed residents of this district. He was born in the township of Wellesley eighty-one years ago on the farm now occupied by his nephew, J. C. McKay.

He married Arabella Beaton over fifty years ago, who predeceased him by several years.

When a young man, he apprenticed himself to blacksmithing at Hawke's Corners. Immediately after learning his trade, he came to Linwood and set up in business for himself, which he continued for about sixty years.

Mr. McKay was appointed magistrate, which position he held for thirty-seven years. In a business capacity and also in connection with his magistrate duties, through his years of experience he entered into the life of the community in a marked degree.

Thoroughly conscientious, and possessing a keen sense of humour with a remarkable understanding of human nature, he won the confidence and friendship of the people with whom he came in contact both during his business career and tenure of office as magistrate and commissioner.

He had been a councillor for several years and was also, for a time, secretary-treasurer of the local school board.

He had been in failing health for about two years.

Surviving are two daughters, V. Elizabeth (Dolly) and Edna, both of Linwood and one niece, Miss Jean Beaton of the staff of Alma Ladies' College, St. Thomas. His only son, Ralph predeceased him several years ago.

The funeral took place on Friday afternoon from his late residence, interment in Linwood cemetery and was largely attended by his many friends of the surrounding community. Rev. A. A. MET DEATH AFTER AN ALL NIGHT PARTY

Witnesses Give Evidence at
Inquest in Connection with
Gordon McTavish Death.

ALLIE KOEBEL TAKEN INTO CUSTODY

Gordon MacTavish, 23 year old farmer of Linwood district came to his death Sunday, April 16th, when hit by a C.P.R. freight train and no blame is attached to train crew for the accident. This was the verdict of the Coroner's jury in charge of Dr. Kalbfleisch which on Monday heard witnesses. Evidence showed that McTavish had attended an all night poker game party where he drank two bottles of home-brew beer. So exhausted from loss of sleep it is believed he fell asleep on the C.P.R. tracks and was decapitated when the three cars passed over his body. A feature following the inquest was the arrest of Allie Koebel, Linwood farmer at whose home the party was held. High County Constable Whiteside made the arrest. At Kitchener Tuesday morning he was charged with selling liquor and keeping a common gaming house. He was granted bail until May 19 in order that he could continue seeding operations at his farm.

At the inquest Engineer Chubb told of seeing McTavish 200 yards away but could not bring his heavy freight of 27 cars laden with wheat until three cars had passed over the body.

Story of Party.

Edgar MacTavish, brother of the victim and several others gave evidence which brought to light the holding of an all night and all day poker party and later resulted in Allie Koebel's arrest.

He told of himself, his brother, Milton Deckert, Robert Deckert and Ernest Wolfe being at Koebel's home about midnight on Saturday, April 15 to play poker. His brother Gordon did not play but drank two bottles of beer for 20 cents at the Koebel home. At seven o'clock in the morning after the poker game had been going strong seven hours Gordon McTavish left and the men were still playing poker at five o'clock in the afternoon when word came announcing McTavish was killed on the C.P.R. tracks.

Mrs. Hilda Deckert told of Gordon McTavish coming to her home at 3.30 Sunday morning for breakfast. His appearance indicated he had been drinking. Another witness John Schleuter said he saw McTavish on the Main street at Linwood but was not drunk, although he seemed to have had some liquor. At about 11 o'clock McTavish approached Harvey MacPherson near the C.P.R. tracks, asked for a match and said he had had some liquor. Ruth McKay, aged 13 years, told of seeing a man on the tracks with one arm across the rail while going home from Sunday school at 11.20. She was frightened and hurried away.

Engineer Chubb said he noticed an object on the tracks 500 yards away but as it was quite common for hoboes to discard old overcoats he did not stop. When 200 yards away he saw it was a human being and immediately applied the brakes. He could have stopped at 500 yards had he known a man was on the track. Conductor Cline examined the body of the man and saw it was still warm indicating McTavish had fallen asleep on the tracks and alive when hit.

Dr. H. J. Shoniker said McTavish's stomach showed liquor had been drunk 18 hours before.

When questioned further by Crown Attorney D. S. Bowlby, Edgar McTavish said he paid for two bottles of home-brew beer and bought two for his brother Gordon. He said that was the last his brother drank to his knowledge. Gordon got drunk on very rare occasions and was not a habitual drinker.

Another witness, Milton Deckert, said he had some beer and gave 50 cents to one of the kids. Crown Attorney Bowlby observed that it was strange kids would be up at two and four in the morning.

Another member of the party, Ernest Wolfe, said he paid 20 cents a quart for home brew and 50 cents for government beer. G. McTavish was sober when he left at seven in the morning.

I put cash on the table after receiving beer stated Robert Deckert. He had not been at Koebel's place before. Clinton Deckert, who came late did not play poker but slept on the sofa from three to eight in the morning.

SPECTACULAR BARN FIRE AT LINWOOD

**15 Year Old Son of John
Schlueter Alone When
Lantern Explodes.**

**\$4000 INSURANCE
COVERS PART OF LOSS**

In a disastrous fire which broke out about two miles southwest of Wallenstein soon after sunset on Saturday evening, a fine barn and adjoining pig-sty belonging to Mr. John Schlueter were burned to the ground, the western skies being luridly aglow for fully five hours after the buildings were engulfed in the ghostly flames. This farm was the former homestead of George Ruler.

Left alone by his parents and the rest of the family who were absent at Parker attending a funeral, the fifteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Schlueter went out to the barn about five o'clock to attend to the usual evening chores and soon thereafter a lighted lantern which he had set down was upset and exploded. In his excitement the terrified boy rushed over to the home of a nearby neighbor for assistance but before he returned a northwesterly wind had fanned the fire into a flaming furnace. All the horses and some sixteen hens were rescued, but eight cows, one bull, one fat heifer, four or five calves, one sow with litter of little pigs, eleven fat hogs and about one hundred chickens fell a helpless prey to the merciless flames. A sleigh, fanning mill, hay loader, hay rake and the summer's crop of hay and grain were also destroyed. The bull and the fat heifer were to have been shipped to the market on Monday, while the eleven fat hogs were being fed in anticipation of the payment of farm taxes in December.

Insurance on the barn to the extent of \$2,500, with \$800 on its contents and some \$700 on all the livestock will but partially cover the heavy loss sustained in this most unfortunate conflagration.

Daylight Robbery At St. Clements

Bandits Truss Bank Manager Jordan and Escape With Close
to Two Thousand Dollars.

LINWOOD MOTORISTS GIVE THIEVES HOT PURSUIT

Two bandits, one about 55, rather tall, well dressed in a blue suit, carrying a top coat over his arm, and his companion somewhere in his early twenties, jauntily attired in a brown suit and a light grey hat, dark hair and sallow complexioned robbed the St. Clements branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce last Friday morning at 11.50 a.m. and escaped in a car, with nearly \$2,000 in currency.

They entered the bank boldly, stepped up to Manager Edward L. Jordan, who was standing at the wicket, reading the morning paper and asked, "Are you the manager?" "Yes", said Mr. Jordan. "Stick 'em up", was the reply and walked through the door to the inner office. "They pulled my hat down over my eyes and threw my coat over my head and while one of them, (I think it was the young fellow) stood over me the other went to the teller's cage and rifled the till.

\$100 in Till

"I think there was about \$100 in bills in the till which they took. Coming back to where I was lying on the floor, the one in the cage asked for the rest of the money. I told them it was in the safe."

The safe was locked the manager said, so the gunmen asked him to open it. As the safe is situated in a dark corner at the rear of the bank an electric light is needed to illuminate the strongbox. This cord for the light is plugged into the socket near the front of the office. The cord was disconnected at the time.

"I can't open it in the dark," Jordan said. "Go ahead and open it," they growled. Jordan insisted he couldn't manipulate the combination without a light. The bandits ordered him to crawl along the floor to the front of the office and connect the light.

Jordan returned and twisted the dial until the doors opened. Approximately \$1,900 in one, two, five and ten dollars bills was in the safe which the robbers stowed away in their pockets.

They had brought along with them several lengths of wire and with this they bound his hands and feet.

"The hat prevented me from seeing them as they tied me up," the manager stated. "I only saw the fingers of one of them, but I judged it was the younger of the two.

"I didn't know after they had left whether or not they had gone out. They had warned me not move for 25 minutes. I listened but could hear nothing so I took a chance, wickered my hands out of the wire and crawled over to the front window."

They were just pulling away as Jordan got there. They had apparently left their motor idling for a quick getaway.

Groping for his gun Jordan hoped to take a shot at the escaping car but found that the bandits had taken it with them and all the ammunition.

As the car drove away Jordan distinguished the numbers "482" and pulling himself around to the other window he noticed that the letters were "CP".

The car was seen by some of the villagers before the holdup, driving up and down but no one suspected that anything radically was wrong. No one saw the men in or near the bank except Mr. James Clark of Ogawa. Apparently there was no one on the street at that time.

Mr. Jordan at once rushed over to Matthew Schummer, who operates a

general store close by and told him the car had rushed away in a westerly direction towards Linwood.

Schummer at once notified provincial police and also his brother Frank who conducts a general store in that town to be on the lookout for a light model sedan bearing license number CP.482.

Shortly after they received word that the car had gone through Linwood, W. C. Rueber, Linwood hardware merchant and Glen McVeigh, teller of the Bank of Nova Scotia, at once gave chase in Rueber's car. From Linwood they sped on to Macdon and from there to Dorking. They then switched south to Stratford and from there to Hession and circled back to Dorking and on down to Wallenstein. From Wallenstein they went northwest to Yutton and then on to Alma. At Alma they had the choice of three directions. Either go straight through to Alma, turn right to Floradale, or left towards Drayton.

As Rueber and McVeigh got quite close to the fleeing machine near Yutton, the driver of the bandit car thought they were getting too close for comfort.

He put his car to a dead stop drew his gun and loosed a fusillade toward the approaching car. Rueber and McVeigh also stopped and poured a volley of shots towards the bandit car but none of the bullets took effect. Only one man appeared to be in the car at that time. Either one of the bandits had left the car or he was crouched low in the back seat.

The chase wasn't ended yet. "He must have been going about 85 or 90 from there on", Rueber stated, "as I was going at 60." At a crossroad where the bandits chose a left turn Rueber was screened by a thick woods. Fearing that the fugitives once they completed the turn might pull up and blaze away as the pursuing car rounded the bend, Rueber slackened his pace until he saw a cloud of dust beyond the bushes but it was too late. The bandits had a lead that could not be overtaken.

When last seen they were going in the direction of Alma.

It was here that Provincial police hoped to capture the gunmen. The chase was given up early in the afternoon but every provincial in the district kept on close watch for the car.

This car was one reported as one being stolen in Hamilton on Saturday morning. The license number of the stolen machine was CP.182. The stroke of a paint brush might easily make the "182" into a "482".

The fugitives were believed heading in the general direction of Alma and thence followed back roads to the northern parts. No clues as yet have been unearthed of the bandit pair. While descriptions furnished by the bank manager are complete, as far as clothes, features, etc., are concerned there were no scars or speech defects noted.

Mr. Jordan has been with the bank for more than 20 years and came from Jordan Station to St. Clements two years ago. He stated, "This was my first holdup and I hope it's my last."

Two men believed to be the wanted bandits are reported to have stayed at the Trail's End Hotel, Conestogo, the night prior to the robbery. The descriptions fit the pair as well as the car which they were driving.

A new check of the bank funds revealed the fact that only \$1,784 was stolen.
