ORIGINAL DEEDS ISSUED IN 1864 FOUND IN LINWOOD (By our Linwood Correspondent)

Miss Nellie Schnurr of Linwood, while looking through some old documents belonging to her father, the late Mr. John Schnurr, came across two Crown Deeds, issued at Quebec on May 20, 1864, by the Province of Ontario to James Grayson Smith, of the town of Strathford. One of them was the deed for fifty acres which comprised the north half of the eastern section of Lot 5 in the 11th concession of Mornington township, for which \$150 was paid. The other was for 100 acres, the north half of Lot 6, concession 11, Mornington township, for which \$300 was paid. The Crown granted to the purchaser all rights and privileges in connection with the said lands, with the exception of all mines of gold and silver, and free use and passage of all navigable waters on any part of same. These deeds are at present displayed at The Sun Office.
