The legality of the election of Dr. G. R. Hain to the Linwood public school board has been the subject of much discussion by ratepayers in Linwood and district. The school, one-half mile from the village, was erected at a time when the majority of the pupils resided in the country. Now the situation is reversed. At the last annual meeting it appeared to many that the rural ratepayers wished to have two members instead of one. When Dr. Hain defeated Wilbur Freeman the legality of the method of taking the vote was questioned. It is said that H. E. Elborn, North Waterloo inspector, will be asked to settle the dispute.

At the meeting a show of hands was taken and Dr. Hain received the biggest vote.

A farmer thereupon questioned the legality and demanded a poll be taken. A heated argument ensued and before a vote could be taken many had left the meeting.

Other members of the school board are Postmaster A. Ament, John Koenig and the new member, Dr. Hain.

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taught by six teachers. The Luther League' enjoyed a very prosperous year, showing a substantial gain in membership as well as in interest and co-operative work.

The Ladies' Aid reported one of the most successful years in its history, showing considerable activity in mission work. Among other things they sent three bales of bedding and clothing to the drought sufferers in the West.

Angus Voll and Alfred Hahn were elected trustees for three years to replace August Holzschuh and Menno Schluetter, whose term had expired.

Ed. Holzshuh was chosen as delegate to the Synod. Before the close of the meeting ways and means for the improvement of finances of the church were discussed. It was decided to hold an "Every Member Canvass" in the near future.
