LINWOOD, May 20.—Threats by ten striking laborers of violence to anyone who volunteered to continue the work on the highway through this village, failed to materialize when a group of country leds, aged between 18 and 21, answered the 7 o'clock call to work. They agreed to accept the usual 20 cent wage.

The strikers, who had been employed Monday noon at 20 cents per hour to drain the south side of the highway through Linwood from the main intersection to the easterly limits of the village, laid down their picks and shovels sharp at noon on Wednesday.

Their demand for an increased wage was reported flatly refused by Reeve P. A. Wagner of Wellosley township. Reeve Wagner stated that no township worker would receive more than 20 cents per hour during the current year.

According to township officials, the road was formerly a township road but had been assumed by the county about a year ago. the brick partition between the two buildings saved the bank from being demolished.

MacCormick said he believed the fire resulted from an overheated stovepipe in the kitchen. "I heard crackling when I went to bed at about 12.30," he told The Chronicle. "but I didn't think anything of it until I awakened to find the building a mass of flames and my wife and family trapped with me in the upstairs."

"We attempted to descend the stairs, but the flames roared up farther and farther and drove us back into one room," he continued. "The smoke nearly blinded me so that I could hardly see where I was dropping my wife and children".

Neighbors gave the family shelter overnight.

Alleged Inadequate Equipment, Lack of Water, Hampers Fire Fighters.

FATHER DROPS WIFE, CHILDREN FROM WINDOW

Leaping 17 feet onto a woodpile, five persons narrowly escaped death at an early hour. Wednesday morning, when trapped in the upstairs of their home in Linwood, near here.

Awakening about 1.45 a.m., to discover the downstairs and part of the upper section of the building enveloped in flames. Joseph MacCormick rushed into the hedroom in which his three children, Mary, 6, Jack, 7, and Frank, 9, were asleep. Assisted by his wife MacCormack swung each of the children out of a bedroom window and dropped them onto a woodpile, to lessen the drop.

Mrs. MacCormick, next to be dropped, missed the woodpile and fell heavily to the ground about 20 feet below. MacCormick himself leaped out of the window as the frames enveloped the entire building.

The children and Mr. MacCormick were uninjured, but the mother suffered slight bruises and lacerations and severe shock.

The building, a hardwore store, owned by Jack Seip, of Foronto, was completely gutted by the blaze with loss estimated at \$4,000. MacCormicks, who had only recently rented the back portion and the upstairs of the building, escaped with only their night apparel. Their loss was estimated at more than \$1,000. George Voll, a district traveller

George Voll, a district traveller was first on the scene, when he heard the terrified screams of the mother and her children as he drove by on the highway. Voll raced to a nearby garage to get a ladder, but the Mac-Cormicks were forced to jump before he could return.

Fanned by a heavy northeast wind, the entire village was threatened by sparks from the blaze. Wellesley fire brigade which raced to Linwood from the nearby village in only a few minutes, were credited with saving a bank and adjoining buildings. Linwood's force pump was sadly inadequate to cope with the blaze. Brigades were called from Elmira, Milverton and St. Jacobs.

So intense was the fire that citizens, awakened by the screams of the trappge! family, assisted in clearing all movable equipment from the adjoining Pank of Nova Scotia and several stores. Firemen said only (Continued on Page 3—No. 3)

Will Expend \$4,000 In Fire Protection

Disastrous Fire Moves Linwood Village To Take Action.

PRESENT EQUIPMENT SAID "ANTIQUATED"

(By Chronicle Correspondent)

LINWOOD.—A fire meeting held in the interest of ratepayers of this village to procure fire prrotection was held Thursday night in Schnurr's Hall before a good portion of ratepayers.

The serious fire which gutted an empty store and a residence about a week ago and which was only brought under control after the Wellesley fire equipment arrived, was the main reason for this meeting.

Waterlow Chronicle November 22, 1938 The Linwood fire equipment was of no use and it was felt among the villagers that protection was needed in this village.

Frank H. Schummer was elected chairman and Joseph Karley, secretary of the meeting. Messrs. Wm. Omand and Alf. Margetts were present from Wellesley to give information about the procedure they went through to procure their equipment and on these lines Linwood are going to follow.

A committee was appointed to investigate the purchase of a second hand truck and in three weeks report back to the ratepayers at a special meeting to then decide whether the village will have more protection or not.

\$4,000 is considered the cost of doing this work. About \$2,100 is considered the price for truck and the balance to increase the water supply. Work commenced on Friday to deepen and widen the present pond at the east end of the village, regardless if equipment is procured and if it is a reservoir is to be built at the west end of the village, each to hold about 20,000 gallons.

The assessment of the village is only \$123,225, which brings in about \$300 annually. It was decided to extend the rates to 5 to 10 years and borrow the money to do so.

The meeting would have liked to know what the actual reduction of insurance would be if this is carried through and this will be found out between now and the next meeting.

The Wellesley delegation submitted their bill for their services the evening of the fire which was \$150. It was decided to leave this until the annual meeting as it was deemed illegal to pass this account as the meeting was not called for that purpose.

The special committee to investigate the purchase of fire equipment are two trustees, R. E. Foster and O. L. Lantz and two ratepayers W. C. Pommer and John Heimbuch.
