

# Barn, Entire Crop Destroyed At Linwood

LINWOOD.—Fire of an unknown origin swept through the barn of Norman Hahn, half a mile east of Linwood late Tuesday destroying the building, the season's recently-harvested crop, equipment and some stock.

One of the finest barns in this district, it was equipped with hydro and had modern equipment, including an electric chopper, milking machine and threshers. These burned along with tons of hay and grain, 500 chickens, 30 pigs, nine calves and a bull.

## Horses, Tractor Saved

Horses were in the barn at the time but escaped when attendants turned them loose. A tractor and colony house also were rescued from the raging inferno.

The Linwood Fire Brigade was summoned and along with neighbors from miles around fought the flames. However, with the season's crop, which was just recently threshed, burning wildly, no headway could be made to save the barn.

The volunteer fire fighters, nevertheless, kept sparks and flying pieces of burning wood from igniting the farm home and a driving shed, situated nearby.

## Owner Was Away

Mr. Hahn was away when the blaze began and didn't know anything of it until he returned home around 7 o'clock. Ironically enough he is reported to have been in Kitchener paying his fire insurance.

Although no figure is estimated, the farmer's loss will reach several thousand dollars.

# December Flood Puzzles Linwood, Invades 3 Homes

LINWOOD, Dec. 13.—Flood waters which swept across several lots of this village yesterday inundating several acres of land have almost subsided.

Belief by workers is that a plugged drain caused the flood but they have been unable to locate the blockage. Although they are still unable to localize the plugged area, they think the pressure of the water has broken the block and allowed the rising waters to subside.

## Flood Spread Quickly

Only three homes were affected by the sweeping waters which began early yesterday and which covered a wide area in a space of a few minutes.

The water, reaching a depth of five feet in some places, flooded three cellars. Two feet of water filled the cellar in the home of Mrs. Richard Ogram and extinguished the furnace fire.

The property of Anthony Koebel suffered the brunt of the flood. His cellar is filled to the depth of four feet and his pigeon pen, housing several of the birds, is partly filled.

Water also covers the floor in the cellar of Mrs. George Manser's residence, adjoining the Koebel property.

## Covers Several Acres

Flood waters covering several acres of land, but causing little damage, swept down past the three partly-inundated homes, across a road and filled a vacant lot adjoining the village blacksmith shop.

The shop, operated by Arthur Peebles, is relatively safe but
