### EDITORIAL NOTES.

This is Ontario's picnic excursion season. The laboring man is making the most of it, according to the newspapers, in which can be found more reports of holiday excursions than we ever remember noticing before. And these same reports show, too, that the excursionists are having a better and more orderly time than ever before. This is one of the national pulse-beats that shows the great era of prosperity which has come to our fair Dominion.

Work on the Preston-Berlin electric railway has been delayed somewhat by the scarcity of labor. The company which is now financing that road is a strong one and outside laborers are being imported so that it is expected to have the service in operation about the first of November.

The coronation of King Edward VII will take place on Saturday of this week. He has made a remarkable recovery from his terrible illness and it is expected that he will be able to stand the coronation ceremonies with very little assistance. The day has been proclaimed a holiday all over the British possessions.

The Canadian Pacific Railway sold over 100,000 acres of land to settlers in the Northwest during the month of March last. In 1901 the March sales did not amount to quite 5,000. The excellent harvests which have been reaped in the Northwest during the past few years have given a remarkable impetus to the settlement of that country.

There are now in operation in the Dominion of Canada 17,824 miles of railway. This is an increase of 15,737 since confederation. Over one thousand million dollars are now invested in railways and canals in Canada.

Stratford is making a success of its Wednesday afternoon half holidays during July and August.

The new beet sugar factory building at Berlin is swarming with men and work is being pushed to the utmost, yet it is feared that it will not be ready before late in the season. Sugar beets in Waterloo are proving a fine crop, far in advance of the Michigan sample, and the prospects in this county are glowing. It is reported that the owners of factories in Michigan have bought \$150,000 worth of stock in the Berlin factory recently. If the manufacture of sugar proves profitable this year it is not at all unlikely that a second factory will shortly be erected in the Twin-city.

Regulations have been issued by the Education Department providing aid for public school libraries chosen in accord with a catalogue arranged by the department. The grant is limited to \$10 a year, and within that limit to half the amount

spent by the trustees, and in case the Legislature does not make sufficient grant, the aid will be distributed pro rata. The department catalogues, history, travel, geography, science, citizenship, etc., but the new regulations will not interfere with the right of trustees to purchase at their own expense books outside this list. The principal of the school is the librarian. Application for aid must be made yearly through the inspector, accompanied by information regarding books purchased, with such vouchers as required from booksellers.
