EDITORIAL NOTES.

As will be seen by the report of the meeting held in Preston on Monday, published in another column it begins to look as if the scheme to extend the Preston-Berlin railway to Wellesley is about matured, and the ratepayers along the route may be voting on the bonus bylaws within the next couple of mouths.

Lurier's radistribution bill is now before the Dominion House. Waterloo County has had the boundaries of its north and south boundaries of its north and south ridings slightly disturbed. For in-stance Waterloo township and its four towns, Berlin, Waterloo, Hes-peler and Preston, are to comprise the "North," while the townships of Woowich, Wellesley, Wilmot and North Dumfries, and the mu-nicipalities of Elmira, Naw How. and North Dumfires, and the mu-nicipalities of Elmira, New Hum-burg, Ayr and Galt comprise the "South" riding. If this arrange-ment goes through the House there won't be much use in holding an election as the north will have a conservative majority of about 800 while the south will go the same number reform. The elections could be settled at the conventions.

The question of repairing the road at Grahm's flats is practically settled. As a result of the public meeting held in the village last Friday evening the Waterloo county council consented to pay their share either with or without a culvert or bridge. It remains now for the Perth committee to say when and how the work shall to be done.

The north part of this township is hopeful of having railway con-nection by the building of the pro-posed extension from Guelph to Goderich. This road would likely touch Linwood and build that enterprising village into a substantial town in a very short time.

Hon. Mr. Blair has resigned his position in Sir Wilfrid Launjer's Cabinet owing to friction with the other members, principally over railway matters.
