## EDITORIAL NOTES.

It is understood the Dominion Parliament will this week settle the boundary lines of the two ridings of Waterloo. Then we'll know where we are at.

If the Attorney-General sent a Provincial detective to attend every rural fall show held in Ontario the fakir nuisance would soon be abated. The man with the "skin game" and the yokel who "bites" are equally guilty, but the absence of police, or the limited powers of those appointed, makes it almost impossible to catch those fellows. Last week one of these sharks was able to snatch a boy's money in Wellesley and then laugh in his face when the lad threatened to get a constable.

The criminal law is also weak in cases like the robbery of a rig from the Wellesley livery last week. Mr. Graham was unable to place the case in the hands of an official who had power to act outside of his own municipality, and as a consequence he will likely lose his horse and buggy. There should be an official in each district who has power to take up the search for stolen articles at the Province's expense, and to do it at once, before the thief can get away with his booty.

The North Waterloo Agricultural Society has a very agreeable set of directors and officials. If big attractions and judicious advertising can do it there ought to be a record-breaking crowd at Berlin on Sept. 29 and 30.

The extension of the Preston-Berlin electric railway to Wellesley has its storm center in the town of Waterloo just now, the point at issue being the granting of a right of way over one of the streets through that town. The G. T. R. is making a strong bid to get the use of that street and if they succeed in ousting the Preston-Berlin people the latter will be in an awkward dilemma. The Waterloo council will decide upon the matter within a week or so. Naturally the people of this section are becoming impatient. But it should be remembered that the electric road has had but scant encouragement from the twin-city, and its progress through those two towns, which should have welcomed it with open arms, has been very slow and disheartening. Active steps towards entering Wellesley, would, of course, be inadvisable until their route through Waterloo is assured.

It looks at present as if the members of the Dominion parliament have a steady job the year round. The end of the session is not yet in sight, and if they don't "get a move on" there will not be time between proroguing and the meeting of the next session to hold the long-talked-of elections.

The other day editor Leslie, of the Tavistock Gazette, lolled back in his easy chair, opened his Printer and Publisher, and prepared to enjoy himself. A moment later he was on his hind feet, with a look of horror in his eyes. "What!" he shouted, "Malcolm McBeth married? I'll have to come next," and he fainted away.
