WELLESLEY EXTENSION NOW AS-SURED.

VISITORS ROYALLY ENTERTAINED.

Invitations to a large number of representative farmers and others in Wellesley, Wilmot and North Easthope townships to attend an important railway meeting in Ber-Important railway meeting in Berlin yesterday as the gnests of the Berlin Board of Trade. Shortly after 10 a. m. the party
