JOINT RAILWAY COMMITTEE MEET ING. — LINWOOD DECLINES THE ELECTRIC SCHEME AT PRESENT.

An important meeting of the Wellesley and Linwood railway committees was held at the Albion hotel, here, last Friday afternoon. There were present : Messrs, Reiner, Hill, Hostetler and Green, of Wellesley; Hohl and Schoultz, of Wilmot; Hart, of North Easthope, of the Wellesley section committee. Messrs. R. Y. Fish, councillor Kerr and ex Reeve Rennie represented the Linwood committee; Reeve Short and councillors Heipel and Lichty were also present.

Mr. J G. Keiner, chairman, stated the object of the meeting. The electric railway project is now so far advanced that it remains with the electors whether the read shall be built or not. The engineer company is ready to build, at least ar far as Listowel, next year, the road to touch Linwood village if the people of that part of the township assist. The bonuses asked for are quite reasonable and will cause but a very slight increase in taxes all along the line while the benefit to the farmers will be im-mense. The proposition is to asks bonnses as follows: Berlin ,\$10,000; Waterloo town, \$1,000; Waterloo township, \$2,000; Wilmot and Forth Easthope, about \$2,000 each. Wellesley will be asked for \$25,000, if the Linwood section will join in helping to build the road to that village, but if not, a smaller sum will be asked from the lower part of the township to build only to Wellesley village and another route to Listowel sought for. He thought the general opinion was that it would be better for Wellesley village if the road stopped here but it would be vastly better for the farming community in the north part of the township to have the part of the township to have the road extend right through it and there is plenty of room for two such places as Wellesley and Lin-wood to thrive, as they und unbtedly would with railway facilities. These two villages had always pulled together hand in hand, and there is now a good opportunity for them to continue to do so to the advanlago of all. He continued with a description of sugar beet industry, and reforred to the Guelph-Goderich scheme. Having hid the matter before the meeting he invited the opinion of the Linwood dele-

gates.
Mr. R Y. Fish was called upon and stated that the Linwood committee had come to this meeting to learn what it could of the electric scheme. He heartily concurred in the chairman's remarks as to the friendly spirit in which Wellesley and Linwool villages had always worked together and in this in-stance there should be no unfriend liness. Linwood section feels its necessity for a railway to give an outlet for that rich section. But that section is at present committed to the Guelph-Golerich scheme He gave a concise, well put state-ment of the affairs of the proposed ine and stated that it is now near ly a fixed fact that that road would be built on the centre route, which would touch Linwood village. would touch Linwood village. Under the circumstances he felt that Linwood section was not in a position to take hold of the electric scheme just now.

Then followed a conversational talk of much interest in which it was brought out that the Linwood section might support the \$25,000 bonus and also a sufficient right-of-way bonus for the C. P. R. both

Mr. Rennie spoke in a strain sim ilar to Mr. Fish's remarks, appreciating the benefits of a railway but at the same time believing that Linwood's present interests lie with the C. P. R. scheme.

Mr. Kerr spoke briefly along the ame lines.

Reeve Short stated the law with regard to submitting of bonus by-laws and expressed the conneil's willingness to meet the wishes of the rate ayers in any way they could. He also explained the position of the municipal loan fund in the possession of the township. This money he thought, could not be touched for railway purposes, except by a vote of the whole township.

Messrs. Fish, Kerr and Rennie then expressed themselves of opin ion that in the present condition of affairs a by-law to aid the electric road would be defeated in the Lin wood district, when the meeting was brought to a close.

reporters The opinion expressed by the Linwood delegates at the railway committee meeting in Wellesley last Friday seems at this stage un-fortunate. If the Maple Loaf was only interested in Wellesley village without caring for the welfare of any other part of this district the rebuff given to the electric road scheme by Linwood would be a matter of rejoicing instead for Wellesley would gain much north-ern trade which Linwood would have got. But the Leaf believes that what is best for the entire district is also best for the village, and it is in that spirit that we view the question. The building of the electric road to Wellesley is an assured, pledged fact if the people the scheme. The same surance was pledged to Linwood as the intention is to run a road to Listowel, and it is willing to make the detour necessary to touch Lin-wood. On the other hand Linwood is not yet positively assured that the 'centre road' will be adopted by the Guelph-Goderich extension,although its chances now seem good Everyone in the south will be glad if Linwood gets the road of its choice, but it will be an occasion of general sorrow if the C. P. R finally decides upon the northern route which would cut that village And should the electric line pass on from Wellesley to Listowel by a route west of Linwood that by a route west of Linwood that village would be doubly isolated, although the farmers of this section would get the great benefit of the sugar-beet raising industry. It would only cost the Linwood section about 75 cents in the \$1000 of assessment to give their share of the bonus for the electric road. If they also decided to vote a bonus they also decided to vote a bonus to buy the right of way for the C. P. R.—and thus secure two railways—the entire tax for both roads would scarcely exceed \$4.50 on a 100 acre farm, for they would have the entire Hawkesville section to help them raise the latter bonus money. None of the Linwood com-

money. None of the Linwood committee who attended the Wellesley meeting were personally opposed to

the electric scheme, but spoke what they considered the views of the people of their section, so it may be that that rich section will yet cast its lot with the electric road before it is too late. Whichever way they finally decide the hope is general throughout the township that that enterprising village will secure railway connection.


