To the Electors of the North Riding of the County of Waterloo:

GENTLEMEN—
Having been nominated by the recent Reform Convention to contest this riding as a supporter of the present Government, of which the Right Honorable Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the Honored Leader, I have consented to do so.
