EDITORIAL NOTES

Russia's Baltic fleet seems to be "running amok" on their trip to the relief of Port Arthur. The act of firing on the British "Trawler" in the North Sea would lead one to think the fleet was ordered by the Emperor. That Great Britain will not allow the British to pay the price for the folly goes without saying, but the event only foreshadows the defeat of the Russians by Japan from the fact that neither on sea nor on land is the former completely officered.

After today the United States can have the election fun all to themselves for a few days while they arrange that small matter of electing a President which it is expected they will accomplish on Tuesday next.

Last Thursday's Globe contained an election warning that the Conservatives were importing a lot of pretty girls from the States to the eastern part of Ontario for the purpose of fascinating the young men there and inducing them to vote Tory. It is said that every western man who was stumping in Eastern Ontario promptly received a peremptory telegram from his wife to come home at once.

It is to be hoped that the Provincial elections will not be called on too soon. The next thing the Wellesley section wants settled is the electric railway matter. Give the magnates time to stake out the route from Waterloo to Wellesley and buy the land, then trot out another election rumpus as soon as you like.

Our financial editor hopes that the "election notes" which have filled the papers lately, and which make rare today will all be settled and that there will be "no protests".

The township of Wellesley votes to-day on the ballot qualification given in the 1903 voters list. That is, the parties whose names were taken by the assessor in February, 1902—twenty-one months ago—and the few who were added by the courts of that year. Berlin, in this same riding, has the advantage of the Registration Act and can vote everything qualified up to twenty-one days or less of the election. Can any one tell where Justice comes into this state of affairs, or why a farmer is not as capable or qualified to register as any one in the country? Both the Dominion and the Provincial parliaments will be in session during the next few months and it might not be out of place to take a few moments of their valuable time in discussing and rectifying anything which may appear to them amiss in the small matter of the people's sacred vote.

The apple situation in this section is a peculiar one this year. While the fall crop has been a very prolific one the winter varieties, especially Northern Spy, is quite poor, although enough for home consumption. The outside demand is absolutely flat and practically there are no buyers, the best picked winter varieties being obtainable for \$1 per barrel. Full apples, except those used for cider, etc., are left to their fate on the trees while many farmers leave whole trees of splendid winter fruit unpicked. The question of a fast Atlantic freight service has always been a hard problem for the government, but when it is once solved there will be a wonderful difference in the fruit interests of Ontario.

The Toronto contests have worn

ished the major part of the excitement in Ontario's election. The campaign of Mr. Hunter has been our procession of comic-racy speeches which have produced very much fun.

To-day is the birthday of the Mikado. The Japanese announce that they will celebrate it by capturing Port Arthur at whatever the cost of life will be.

The Newfoundland elections occurred on Tuesday, the Bond ministry being sustained after a bitter fight. This means that the island is not yet prepared to join the confederation.

The United States have their little Presidential adjudication next Tuesday. It will likely keep them busy all day.
