EDITORIAL NOTES.

Hon. Nelson Montelth has introduced a bill in the Ontario Legislature which practically abolishes the present system of organizing county councils and reverts to the former plan of having the municipal reeves and deputy reeves constitute the county board. This is a move in which the Legislature should "make haste slowly," for it is treading on debatable ground and a vital interest is involved. The present system, in which the county council is formed by the election of commissioners by districts in the county has scarcely been in operation long enough to thoroughly test its merits. That it has done some good is amply proven, but there is a strong feeling that the township councils are deteriorating as a result of the fact that the ambition of a township councillor is confined to the limits of the municipality in which he serves. Had the old system proven entirely satisfactory there would have been no call for the change which was made eight or ten years ago, but having decided to remodel the county council with the object of improving it there does not at present appear to be defects enough in the present system to warrant its abolition and a return to the old. The discussion on Mr. Montelth's Bill will be closely watched all over the Province.

If the Waterloo county council intends to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Ferdinand Walter in time for the June session it is high time that an official announcement was made of the fact. It has been rumored in the county press that nominations were to be held on the 22nd inst., and the Maple Leaf promptly published the rumor as was its duty, but the matter is of too much importance to leave obscure and indefinite until the last minute allowed by law. Wellesley district has always prided itself on having two of the very ablest representatives at the county Board, and now that there is a vacancy to be filled ample time should be given the electors to carefully make a proper selection. There is splendid county council talent in Wellesley township, but a last-minute nomination announcement is not the way to bring it out. This division of the county has every confidence in the council, and especially in its remaining representative, Mr. Fisher, of Waterloo, and would be satisfied to allow the vacancy to remain, if necessary, until the end of the year. But if a successor to Mr. Walter is to be chosen at once that fact should, ere this, have been given ample publicity.

Hon. C. F. Hymn has been given the portfolio made vacant by the death of Hon. James Sutherland, and the writ for his election are to be issued at once.

Mr. Ganey introduced a motion in the Legislature last week to expunge from the records of the House the resolution passed a year ago censuring him for his connection with the Stratton scandal. The motion passed on a party vote the majority being 40.

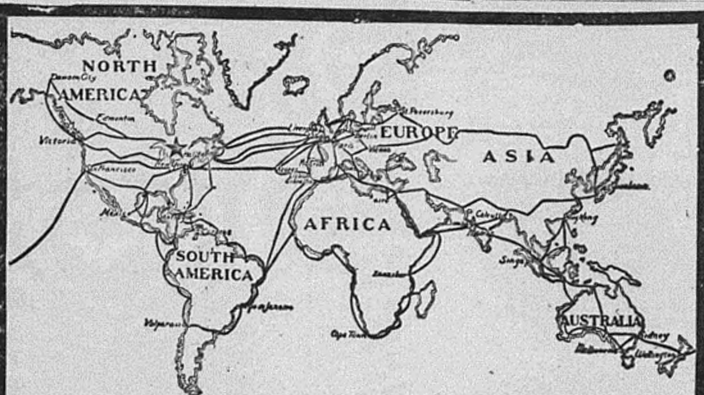

REPORT.

The Directors have pleasure in submitting the Twenty-third Annual Report for the year ending 28th February, 1905.

The business of the Bank has continued active and progressive. The net profits of the year have amounted to \$78,836.36, or about 16% per cent. upon the average paid up capital of the Bank, which, added to the balance carried forward from the previous year of \$2,887.70, amounts to \$81,724.06.

Out of this sum two half yearly Dividends of 3% per cent. each have been paid, absorbing \$53,924.81, \$32,500.00 carried to the Ret. Account, and \$15,299.25 carried forward to the credit of Profit and Loss.

The Dep. as of the Bank have increased \$527,032.30, and the circulation \$34,640, and the gross assets \$718,145.85 over the previous year. The losses of the year have been small.

The Ret. Account of the Bank now stands a \$250,000, or equal to 50% of the paid up capital.

The Agencies of the Bank have been recently inspected and found in a satisfactory condition.
