THE APPLE WORM.

BY PROF. LOCHEAD, OF THE O.A.C.

The coddling worm is the cause of greater loss to the apple industry than any other insect. The loss to Ontario alone runs every year into hundreds of thousands of dollars, and into the millions in the United States, all because the remedies which have been discovered

applied by the apple growers.

While there is but one brood of the coddling moth (apple worm) east and north of Toronto, there two broods west and south of the same place. The different stages of this insect pest should be famil iar to the apple grower, for only with this knowledge can he apply his remedies intelligently. The life story can be stated concisely as follows: The insect winters over a a caterpiller in a cocoon in protected place, and in early June when the blosson s are falling from the apple the adult winged moths appear. The females deposit eggs on the leaves and newly The females deposit their ed fruit In about ten days the ca' erithar is about ten days the car-erpillar secape from the eggs and a few days later enter the apples usually at the calyx end. The "worm" remains inside the applabout 20 days, after which it comes out to spin a occoon within which it lives until spring if there is but one brood, but only about two weeks if there are two broods in a season. The second brood of m the appear about the end of July or in the beginning of August, then eggs are again deposited, and the "worms" which batch from these eggs enter the developed apples ing them again in September to make coccons in which to spend the winter. The plan is to poison the "worms" with Paris Green or some other arsenic mixture before they enter the fruit. The trees should be sprayed (I) a few days after the blossoms fall, and (2) about the middle of August for the second brood of larvae. An additional spraying ten days or two weeks aftor the first will, in most cases, be productive of much sood visable, of course, to use the arsenic mixture along with control the apple scab fungus at the same tue that this codling moth is being treated. For the scab two additional sprayings are necessary—one before blossoming and one in July.

The Bordeaux-Paris Green mixture is prepared according to the following formula: Copper sul-phate or bluestone, 4 lbs; fresh lime, 4 bs; water, 40 gals; Paris Green, 4 to 6 ounces. The blue-stone is dissolved in 15 to 20 gallons of water in a barrel, and in another barrel the lime is slaked carefully and 10 to 15 gallons of water are added sto make a milk of line. Then strain both barrels into the spray barrel.

How Trees Differ as to Their Roots. Trees whose roots are of the same length and filter do not thrive as well as those which are unequal, because they develop better who their roots reach for nutriment in different sirats or depths of the earth. The oak could not live in soil where the pine would intrive inzuriantly. This is owing to the nature of the trees. One requires the most soild nutriment. The pine requires light, sandy soil and the atmospheric conditions of sunshines and rain. The oak, maple, elm, hemlock, birch and beech all require warm and clean soil. This is a move in which the Legislature should "make haste slowly," for it is treading on debatable ground and a vital interest is involved. The present system, in which the county council is formed by the election of comsioners by districts in the county has scarcely been in operation long enough to thoroughly test its mor-its. . That it has done some good is amply proven, but there is a strong feeling that the township councils are deteriorating as a result of the fact that the ambit on of a township councillor is confined to the limits of the municipality in which he serves. Had the old system proven entirely satisfactory there would have been no call for the change which was made eight or ten years ago, but having decided to remode the county council with the object of improving it there does not at present appear to be defects enough in the present system to warrant its abolition and a return to the the old. The discussion on Mr. Monteith's Bill will be closely watch ed all over the Province

If the Waterloo county council intends to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Ferdinand Walter in time for the June session it is high time that an official anment was made of the fact. It has been rumored in the county pross that nominations were to be held on the 22nd inst., and the Maple Leaf promptly published the ramor as was its duty, but the mat-ter is of too much importance to leave obscure and indefinite until the last minute allowed by law. Wellesley district has always prided itself on having two of the very ablest representatives at the county Board, and now that there is a vacancy to be filled ample time should be given the electors to carefully make a proper selection. There is splendid county council Talent in Wellesley township, but a lastminute nominition annoncement is not the way to bring it out. This division of the county has every confidence in the council, and especially in its remaining representative. Mr. Fisher, of Waterloo, and would be satisfied to allow the vacancy to remain, if necessary, until the ond of the year. 
