Wellesley township developed a considerable excitement during the last couple of days before the voting. The indications on nomination day pointed towards acclamation, but the unexpected may always be looked for in municipal politics. The result of the voting appears elsewhere.

In Wilmot all the old council were elected by acclamation. Although there were no less than 22 nominations made, all except the old council afterwards resigned.

### SCHOOL MEETING.

Wellesley school section held its annual meeting in the school house on Wednesday, there being a fair attendance.

Mr. H. K. Forier was called to the chair and Mr. E. E. Ratz was chosen as secretary.

After reading minutes of last annual meeting the auditors report was read, showing receipts amounting to \$1193.12 and expenses \$2249.77, (of which the teachers' salaries amounted to \$1460) leaving a surplus of \$1943.24. The report was adopted.

The ratepayers elected Mr. E. E. Ratz as auditor for next year.

The trustees' report showed, among other things, that the total number of scholars on the roll last year was 184 and the average attendance was second highest in the county.

A discussion on the matter of extending the noon hour from one hour to one hour and a quarter followed. The plan did not meet with general support, but it was thought the experiment might be tried during the warm summer months.

The election of a new trustee resulted in the election of Mr. Peter Lichty.

A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. John Hill, the retiring trustee who is leaving town, also to the chairman and secretary, and the meeting adjourned.
