The Ontario elections occur of The Ontario elections occar on Wednesday, January 25th, with the nominations on the 18th. The candidates in this section are North Waterloo, Dr. Lackner, Conservative, Geo Moore, Reform: Bouth Parkeys Dr. Thompson, Beform Waterloo, Cr. Thompson, Reform.
G. Pattinson, Conservative (there is probably a "Labor" candidate also in this riding); North Perth, John Brown, Reform, Jay. Torrance Conservative : South Perth, Nelson Monteith, Conservative, V. Stock. Beform. Political meetings and excitement will, no doubt, fill in the dull winter days of the greater part of this month.

14 The Ontario political situation in the present election is a somewhat inique one in that there is so little difference in the government pol-face of the two parties. Yet the dividing lines are very sharply drawn, and the predominating cry -corruption.
