The Municipal Council of the Township of Wellesley met, pursuant to adjournment, on Monday, the 8th day of February, 1905, at the Township Hall, Crosshill, 10 o'clock a.m. All members of the Board were present. It was finally moved by J. B. Lichy, seconded by A. P. Dammeier, that this council do now adjourn to meet again the first Monday in March at the Township Hall, Crosshill, at 10 o'clock, a.m. sharp when pathmasters, pound keepers and fence-viewers will be appointed.—Carried.

Council met at the Town Hall on Feb. 6, all members present.

The Collector presented his roll, which showed all taxes paid excepting \$1.26, which was ordered to be struck off, and \$3 34 non-resident. Collector was relieved of his duties for the past year.

Mr. Patterson, of the Patterson, Ellis, Whelhan Co., of St. Marys presented their account for tile for 1903 and 1904, which amounted to (1903) \$143.95 and (1904) \$148.05, and cheques were issued for the same.

### EDITORIAL NOTES.

Writs have been issued for the re-election of Premier Whitney's new Cabinet Ministers. The nominations have been set for Feb. 21, and the elections one week later. It is expected that these Ministers will all be returned by acclamation as has been customary in such cases.

The Berlin beet sugar factory has already assurances of an extra heavy business next year. The high price of sugar and the encouraging prices the farmers have received has had the effect of inducing farmers at long distances from the factory to grow beets, so that the total acreage next year promises to be far larger than any previous year in the factory's history. A trolley line through Wellesley township would add nearly a month's business to the factory every year.

In an article stating that the Carleton township council has been unable to secure assessors at the salary offered, the Midway Gazette makes the following pertinent remarks about the working of the new Ontario Assessment Act: "The salary is declared by all who have studied the law to be entirely too small for the work to be done. The work is not only greatly increased, but it is hard to understand how to apply the law, and in many ways there is more red tape than common sense displayed in the amendments. Personal property is no longer to be assessed, and instead a business tax is to be imposed, not according to the amount of business done, but according to the value of the building in which the business is transacted. This will cut off two thirds of the old assessment of merchants' stock of goods. New assessments are introduced. Physicians, conveyancers, dentists, veterinary surgeons, hotelkeepers, manufacturers, brewers, photographers, etc., all have to be assessed according to the value of the building and land in which their work is done, and not according to the volume of business transacted. Then real property is to be assessed so as to show the value of land without buildings and also value of land with the buildings. What purpose this will serve is hard to understand. The assessed value of land with the buildings on it, is enough for all practical purposes, and is much easier to get at. If the Legislature wants to find out the value of buildings on farm lands, for statistical purposes, buildings should be assessed for as nearly cost price as possible, but why should a farmer's buildings be assessed for taxation purposes alone? The true way to assess farm lands is to assess them near their selling price as possible. Any one conversant with such matters knows that an average 100 acre farm may have buildings that cost as much as \$3000, and such buildings will not add to the selling price of the farm one half what they cost, and in many cases not one third of cost, then what value or benefit can accrue to any one by separating the value of the land and buildings in making an assessment? It is to be hoped that the new government will turn out better legislation in the line of Assessment Acts for the present act is a puzzle and a farce in many ways.

The United States government has introduced a tariff policy, known as the "drawback," by which they claim they will capture the markets of the world. Under this law the U. S. manufacturer will receive a rebate of 99 per cent. of all duties upon the foreign article he manufactures and ex-

ports. The Canadian manufacturer naturally is alarmed at this measure which threatens his existence, and the Dominion government will be urged to protect its industries by proclaiming an export duty upon wheat, pulpwood, and other raw material which the U. S. manufacturers require almost exclusively from Canada. As the Canadian producer, manufacturer and consumer all have different standpoints from which to view this matter there will naturally be a clashing of opinion, but the welfare of the Dominion as a whole should be paramount. The north-west wheat raiser should not be considered at the expense of the Ontario manufacturer, nor vice versa; there should be a medium which would give a fair measure of justice to all. The steel rail industry has shown what Canada can do as a manufacturer of our raw material and a similar rule applied to our own natural wood, grains and ores would give a wonderful impetus to the industries and growth of the Dominion.
