## EDITORIAL NOTES.

It now seems that Gen. Kourapat-kan't.

Buffalo Bill has a great wild west show but Autonomy Bill's show will be the leader in Canada this summer.

Hon. Nelson Monteith, Minister of Agriculture, will be banqueted in Tavistock the latter part of this month or early in April.

When Kourapatkin said he would drive the Japs into the ocean he meant the Arctic. If he can keep up the gait he is going this week he'll land 'n' up there soon.

Stratford has about given up hopes of a union station and is settling down to carry the right-of-way bonus for the river valley route. Meantime Berlin is doing nothing to secure the trolley connection for which all those bonuses were voted last winter. If that project falls through its epitaph will be: "The scheme that failed because of Berlin's splendid inactivity."

The rout of the immense Russian Army at Mukden this week is the most disastrous battle of modern history. A host of over half a million men, well armed and equipped, in full flight—literally throwing away their arms and running for their lives—presents a sight which has not been seen since the days of Attila. Reports, so far, say that the Russian loss is over 200,000 men, with a strong possibility that the entire host will be captured. The story is: the more unique from the fact that the victorious Japanese army is no larger, if, indeed, as large, as the enemy they have so utterly defeated.

The total vote in the January Provincial elections was 444,497. The electors nearly put the Province on "all fours."

Some day the Dominion government will bottle up the school question and label it "poison."

Wilmot township is lucky in escaping an action for damages over the recent fatal accident near Baden. A similar fatality was narrowly missed in that horrible strip of road just south of Wellesley a week or so ago. Two ladies were driving in a cutter when their horse stumbled sideways in a pitch hole and the entire outfit went down the steep side of the unprotected ravine. The cutter and horse rolled completely over twice the cutter being smashed but the ladies and the horse escaping with some bad bruises. The ratepayers are willing to pay the price for having better winter roads and it will be too bad if the councils drag behind the times until a heavy action for damages has to be met. Old settlers say that in the early days when there was plenty of woods the winter roads were much better than they are now. In these present days, when the necessity for good winter roads is so much greater, and the traffic so vastly increased, the councils are justified, and will be sustained by the ratepayers, in making heavy expenditures to improve the roads to meet the necessities of modern farming.

With a majority of about 70 behind him Sir Wilfrid Laurier is at his wit's end to carry out the legislation he desires in connection with the erection of two new Provinces in the Northwest. The separate school system which he propounds is objectionable to Reformers and Conservatives alike, outside of Quebec, and the feeling expressed all over the Dominion indicates that

church domination of schools is not the principle which should prevail in Canada. If Laurier appeals to the country on this question it is not impossible that the supporters of "free" schools in both political parties will broaden the problem to involve a reformation of the school systems in Ontario and Quebec as well as the other Provinces. This would mean the amending of the British North American Act, and an election upon such an issue would prove the most exciting in the history of the Dominion.


