### EDITORIAL NOTES.

Application is being made for an electric railway charter to connect New Hamburg, Tavolock, Shakespear and Stratford with Lake Huron and points en route.

That "death-like stillness in the air" this week is easy to account for. Both parliaments are taking their Easter holidays.

The retirement of Mr. Ferdinand Walter from the county council on account of his having accepted the License Inspectorship leaves a vacancy which will likely be filled before the June session. There will be important work before that meeting, especially if another equalization is attempted under the new Act, and this section would be well pleased if Mr. Walter was empowered to act in the dual capacity of Inspector and County Councillor, at least until the June session is over. Mr. Walter has for so long, and so acceptably, represented Wellesley in county matters that it will be difficult to replace him, although his counsel will, no doubt, be available to his successor.

Just who will succeed Mr. Walter as county councillor it is difficult at this writing to say. The ones most likely to be brought forward are Messrs. H. Y. Fish, of Linwood, ex-rev. Short, Mr. Hugh McCulloch, of Hawkesville, Mr. W. J. Beggs, near Linwood, and Mr. Alex. McDonald, of Wellesley village. The latter is a new comer to Wellesley township from North Easthope, but his long experience in the Perth county council gives him a prominence for the vacancy which is very popular with his many friends in the south part of the township. Mr. Fish is an old member of the Waterloo county council and would be a capable representative if he could be induced to re-enter the work. Mr. Short has had a long experience in public life and should be well acquainted with the needs of the township. Mr. McCulloch is well qualified by wide experience and high education to step into the gap and Mr. Beggs is known to be a shrewd man who would ably represent the township at the county board. It is likely the nomination meeting will soon be announced when there should be a full attendance of ratepayers and the very best man chosen for this very important position.

Mr. Walter has been in public life in Wellesley township ever since 1865, forty years ago, and he has continuously held the entire confidence of the rate payers. It is fitting that the close of his long and useful career should be marked by a public testimonial and we hope that the council at their meeting next Monday will take the initiative in the matter.

The tremendous journey of the Russian Baltic fleet from European to Asiatic waters is one of the gigantic events of the present war. It is also remarkable that during the latter half of the journey the Japanese fleet has been practically without striking distance continuously without firing a shot. It is evident that the Russians are seeking an engagement so that if they are not attacked within a few days they themselves will become the aggressors.

Petitions are being circulated all over the Dominion asking the government to build and equip a first-class battleship as a contribution to Great Britain's imperial navy. It is intended as a move towards the great inter-imperial preferential trade proposition.

Waterloo has fallen in line with

the other counties which are applying to parliament to abandon the present system of organizing county councils, and return to the old plan of having the county board composed of the reeves and deputies of the various municipalities.

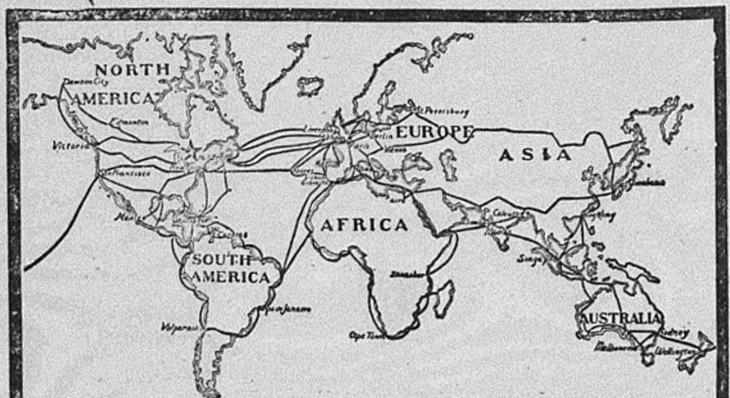

The Hospital had last year in its beds and cots 761 patients, 267 of these were from 194 places outside of Toronto. The cost is 98 cents per patient per day, and there were 129 sick little ones a day in the Hospital.
