The 655th session of Wilmot To. Council was held at the Tp. Hall, Baden, on the 17th of April 1905. Mombers all present, the Reeve presiding. The minutes of previous session were read and confirmed

The Reeve and Clerk (delegates appointed to attend the meeting of Municipal Delegates at Toronto, and to wait upon the Government to ask for certain amondments to the Mun icipal Act) reported having attended at Toronto on the 12th inst. when a list of proposed amendments was prepared and discussed, the chief of which was the repealing of the latter portion of clause 506 of "the Municipal Act" and thereby abolishing civil liability of Municipalities, in case of accidents on the public highway. On the 13th inst. the Premier, Hon Mr. Whitney, Hon Mr. Foy and the Hon Mr. Willough by received the Delegates about 200 in number, in a very kind and courteous manner, listened to the various amendments proposed very ttentively and asked many perti nent questions. The Bon. Promier stated in reply that he did not wish to jump from one extreme to another and that, while no doubt the present act was abused in many cases he did n. t wi h to see any poor man prevented from receiving justice owing to his inability to to guarantee costs. He thought there was scarcely a single person in the province of Ontario who thoroughly the Municipal Act in its present soom and that it might be well to boil it down and remodel it so as to leave only about two we have in the present Act. He was averse to continually tinkering with the Municipal Act and thought that it might be well to limit the ammending of the Act to once in four years. He thanked He thanked the Delegation for their suggestions and promised to carefully consider the same. The delegates then with

The retirement of Mr. Ferdinand Walter from the county council on account of his having accepted the License Inspectorship leaves a vacancy which will likely be filled be fore the June session. There will be important work before that eting, especially if another equalization is attempted under the new Act, and this section would be well pleased if Mr. Walter was enpowered to act in the dual capacity of Inspector and County Councillor, at least until the June session is over. Mr. Walter has for so long, and soncceptably, represented Wellesley in county matters that it will be difficult to replace him, although his counsel will no doubt, be available to his successor.

Just who will succeed Mr. Walter county councillor it is difficult at this writing to say. The onesmost likely to be brought forward are Messrs. R. Y. Fish, of Linwood, ex-reeve Short, Mr. Hugh McCulloch, of Hawkesville. Mr. W. J. Beggs,near Linwood, and Mr. Alox. McDonald, of Wollesley village. The latter is a new comer to Wellesley township from North East. hope, but his long experience in the Perth county council gives him a prominency for the vacancy which is, very popular with his maffy friends in the south part of the township. Mr. Fish is an old mem-ber of the Waterloo county council and would be a capable representa-tive if he could be induced to re-enter the work. Mr. Short has had a long experience in public life and should be well acquainted with the needs of the township. Mr. McCulloch is well qualified by wide experience and high education to step into the gap and Mr. Beggs to be a shewd man who would ably represent the township at the county board. It is likely the nomination meeting will the nomination meeting will soon be announced when there should be a full attendance of ratepayers and the very best man chosen for this very important position.

Mr. Walter has been in public life in Wellesley township ever since 1865, forty years ago, and he has continuously held the entire ness continuously near the entire confidence of the rate payers. It is fitting that the close of his long and useful career should be marked by a public testimonial and we hope that the council at their moeti next Monday will take the initia tive in the matter.


