EDITORIAL NOTES.

e bye elections in North Oxford and the city of London occur-June 13th. North Oxford is made vacant by the death of Hon. James Sutherland, and London by the advancement of Hon. Mr. Hyman to Mr. Sutherland's portfolio. Both constituencies are being hotly contested by the conservatives on the question of the school and land clauses in the Autonomy Bill now before the Dominion House. The result of these elections will have considerable effect upon the final debate upon this Bill, the terms of which were not made an issue in the elections last November. If the Reformers win it will be taken that the electors of Ontario are not quarroling with the government's position on the school clauses, and will thus silence much talk in the House. On the other hand if the victory goes to the Conservatives some of the Ontario Members of parliament will become very anxious as to which way they should vote in the interest of retaining

During the past week not one word of news has been given out concerning the steam extension of the C. P. R. to Stratford. Perhaps this is because the Classic City is "studying up" the electric system, or perhaps they are sholding their breath in anxiety for the President's decision. The apathy which reigns decision. The aparty which resigns supreme at Berlin seems to spread to Stratford, too, and Wellesley may yet have to turn to the G. T. R. for connection at Baden.

Later-Stratford has demanded an answer at once from the C. P. R. and we may, before the last forms are on the press, have further in-formation whether Stratford's proposition will be accepted or not

Last year the Galt hospital treat-ed 428 patients of all kinds at an expense of \$8,385.58, more than one half of which was paid by the patients themselves, the balance being made up by grants, bequests, investments, etc. In Stratford hos-pital the number of patients in 1904 was 329, maintained at a total cost of \$8,525.f7. The Berlin and Waterloo hospital had a tolal of 206 persons under treatment, the total cost being \$7,611.86, of which the patients paid \$1,512.78. There are in all sixty-one public hospitals in Ontario

The great naval battle between the Bussian and Japanese ficets was fought in the straits of Corea on Saturday and Sunday. The di-as-ter to the Russians was a terrible one, their Armada being shattered and dispersed, and the Japanese are now complete masters of the situa tion in the eastern seas. And when to this is added the fact that they have an army of over half a million men in Manchuria, close to their base and well equipped, it cannot be long until the fall of Vladivostock leaves them no other enemy to conquer in Eastern Rus-
