WELLESLEY COUNCIL.

The municipal council of the township of Wellesley met, pursuant to adjournment, on Monday, June the 5th, at 10 o'clock a. m. at the township hall, Crosshill. All members of the board were present. K. J. Kerr, the reeve, in the chair. Minutes of the May session were read and adopted.

Communications, bills and accounts were presented and after being read orders were issued correspondingly on motion by Messrs. Lichty and Dammeier, carried by the reeve as follows, viz:

A Delegation from Waterloo, comprising the following gentlemen: Messrs. Hughes, Riddell, Diebold and Greyerzlehl, approached the board re the Berlin and Waterloo hospital and solicited a grant from this municipality which should tend to assist in defraying the expenses in carrying out the object of the said institution. All of the above delivered most eloquent addresses thereby clearly defining the whole management of that great

Institution. They quoted some of the municipalities of this riding that had so far made grants and sincerely hoped Wellesley township would follow so good an example. No action was taken at this meeting. Council adjourned at 12.30 p. m.

At 2 o'clock p. m. the council adjourned from their ordinary business and formed into a court of Revision. After the declarations of office of the said members had been made and signed before the clerk K. J. Kerr was made chairman of said court on motion of Messrs. Huehn and Heipel.

The List of complaints, as received by the clerk on or before the 13th day of May, was handed to the chairman. All members of said court fully considered and investigated the several complaints and after all the evidence appertaining thereto was received, the chairman reported as follows, viz: We, the court of Revision for the township of Wellesley, beg to report that we have examined the different appeals and have compared the same with the assessment rolls of said Municipality for the year 1905 and we hereby authorize the different assessors to change and alter their rolls accordingly and the rolls so altered be and hereby are accepted as the assessment rolls of the township or Wellesley for the year of 1905 as follows, viz: The assessment of Chris Schlueter was lowered \$300 of which amount \$250 was assessed to the G. & G. R. Co.; 2 acres part lot 19, con a, o s of G Schallhorn was changed to David Kraemer; 1/4 acre v lot 16 con 10 w s of Aug. Dammeier, Mr. was changed to Emma Schluter; 1/4 acre v lot 12 con 1, e s, of Chas. Schwalm was changed to John F. Schmidt; the assessment of A. McDonald was reduced \$300 being erroneously assessed; the appeal of the Bell Telephone Co. was allowed.

Dogs were struck off the rolls for the following parties: Geo. S. Meyer, 1; John S. Meyer, 1 and E. Dietrich, 1 dog

On motion by Messrs. Lichty and Huehn court resumed in open council and accepted the report final as stated above.

Whereupon it was moved by Mr. Huehn, seconded by Mr. Heipel, that by-law No. 1, for the appointment of an assistant Sanitary Inspector in room of John Stroh, deceased, be now read a first and second time—Carried.

Messrs. Martinson and Scully addressed the Board re a grant to assist them in filling up the flats on the north-west side of what is known as the Martinson bridge over the Conestoga. In opposition to this Mr. Pronilive appeared and asked the council to take no action at this meeting, which was complied with.

It was then moved by Mr. Lichty, seconded by Mr. Dammeier, that the sum of \$2.60 be paid to Mr. J. Koebel as compensation for one lamb killed by a dog or dogs, and that the reeve issue his order accordingly—Carried.

A petition signed by G. Altes and seven others praying this Board to make a grant of 20c per rod for 20 rods on the north side of con. A, at lot 1 was presented. After due consideration the council decided to take no action.

The council then went into committee of the whole on by-law No. 561, Mr. Huehn in the chair. H. Diss was appointed assistant Sanitary Inspector in room of John Stroh, deceased, for the year 1905.

On motion of Messrs. Heipel and Dammeier committee resumed in open council.

On motion by Messrs. Lichty and

Dammeier by-law No. 561 was read and passed.

It was then moved by Mr. Huehn seconded by Mr. Heipel, that the sum of \$3 be paid to J. Koebel, being amount of award for killing a dog in the act of worrying sheep, and that the reeve issue his order for same—Carried.

On motion of Messrs. Lichty and Heipel, carried by the reeve, Mr. C. A. Kennel was appointed pathmaster in place of Mr. C. Schwalm, who has removed from the township.

It was finally moved by A. Heipel seconded by H. N. Huehn, that this council do now adjourn to meet again the first Monday in July at the township hall, Crosshill, at 10 o'clock, a. m., sharp—Carried.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Now that Japan has Russia about thrashed the other great powers are getting ready to step in and arrange the terms of peace. Japan had a costly experience of this kind a dozen or so years ago when she had overthrown China. At that time the great powers arbitrated the terms of settlement so that each of themselves got a goodly slice of the spoils of war until there was almost nothing left for the victorious Japs. It remains to be seen what use the Japan government makes of this dearly bought experience in settling with Russia when the peace terms are being fixed. We mistake the temper of the little islanders if they allow themselves to be humiliated by that game a second time. Japan has knocked around a bit of late years learning a thing or two, and at the same time developed enough spunk to make it of use to themselves when settling day comes.

Goelph is getting to be what the Americans would call a "good show town." It has a spring show, an agricultural college show, a fall show, a winter fat stock show; and now it has added a horse show. In fact the Royal City is making quite a show of itself.

The two most elusive objects of human research are the "pot of gold where the rainbow touches the earth," and the north pole. Not much effort is expended on the former after early manhood is reached but the hunt for the "pond where the water-fowl fly to in the spring" is kept up until the hair of the pole hunters grows white as the arctic snow. Millions are spent in equipping and maintaining expeditions whose only remuneration is the so-called honor of having got a little farther north than somebody else. The hope of adventurers to bring that pole home to hang their nation's flag on is as chimerical as ever. Meantime there is a field of discovery which might prove of the utmost use to the world which is left almost entirely untouched and which could be developed at a small fraction of the cost of those north pole expeditions. This field extends straight overhead, in the ether above the wind and cloud line, where immense balloons properly equipped and anchored at a height of six or seven miles might find invaluable discoveries in the thin electric air waves in which Marconi has already found so much although he has scarcely left the earth's surface. If it is worth millions to chase after the north pole, a few thousands expended in a scientific exploration of the upper air would not be missed.

Norway and Sweden, which have been politically united and ruled over by one King for the last ninety years, dissolved partnership the other day, and one of those nations is now advertising for a new king.

What a blessing the daily newspapers are to the country! Without them we would all be deluded into the notion that our legislators were fairly honest men. The electors hold conventions and select as candidates the fellows who have likely been born and bred in the constituency out of families with four-generation reputations for integrity. In our stupidity we elect those men to office and feel then that we have done a good deed. Then come bye-elections in North Oxford and London and our noble, wise, infallible daily papers inform us that Laurier and Borden, Foster and his warm friend Mulock, Patterson, Bennett, et al, down to the cross-roads stumper, are cheats, villains,

and so many other bad things that there is no hope of a girl or a boy ever being again elected to parliament in this generation by an honest electorate. Verily the people owe a debt of gratitude to the daily press for pointing out the villains whom we ought to honor at the polls.

Two bye-elections were held in Ontario on Tuesday. North Oxford was vacated by the death of Hon. James Sutherland, and London was opened by the appointment of Hon. C. Hyman to the vacant portfolio. Both constituencies again returned Reformers, Hyman's majority being about 330, and Smith's in N. Oxford about 350. Both elections were fought on the question of allowing the two new provinces to make their own school laws.

The editors of the Milverton Sun and the Tavistock Gazette are jumping at each other's throats these days over football matters. We warn these two husky young backsliders that they are spilling their last drop of getting wived by showing their bad streak so recklessly.

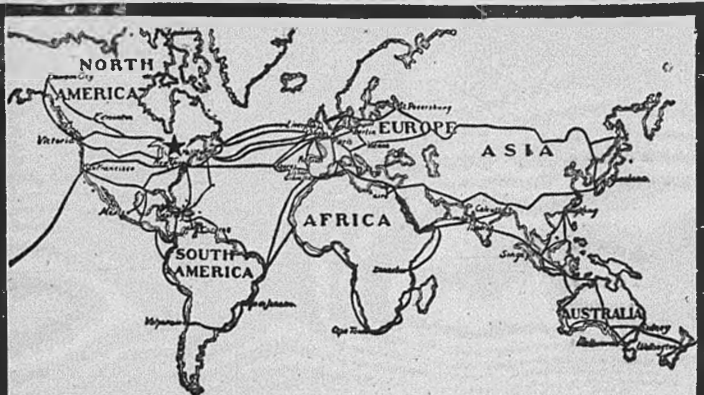

Let the money of the strong be merry to the weak. The Hospital pays out dividends of health and happiness to suffering childhood on every dollar that is paid by the friends of little children.
