WINNIPEG NEWS.

Written for the Maple Leaf by a Wellesley Boy.

The Winnipeg council was of the opinion that the census of this rapidly growing city should be taken oftener than once every ten years. It was finally decided to make it every five years, and so they set to work at once to bring a report before the public. The returns just completed give Winnipeg a population of 80,000 inhabitants, and including the suburbs, nearly 90,000. Five years ago the population was 40,000, thus showing that the "see and Chicago" (as it is called) has doubled itself in that space of time. What will the number be at the end of the next five years.

The fact that houses are very scarce in this city is shown by the report of the census takers, whose duty among other things, was to enquire how many persons slept in each house. One of them was astonished to learn that 42 persons had slept in one house. He wondered where they all could find shelter in that building, but the old rule "where there's a will there's a way" has to be applied out here.

The past month was rather wet, which may cause considerable damage to the wheat crop, more especially on low lands. But the dry weather of the present time may help it considerably.

The Scott Furniture Co.'s fine six story building was struck by lightning and completely destroyed. The structure was only completed last October and was filled with the finest of furniture. Loss, \$200,000, partially insured. The Company will rebuild at once.

The city water commissioners are building an immense reservoir for water storage with a capacity of in the neighborhood of sixty millions of gallons. This will help the city greatly in its water difficulty, as the water from the Assiniboine river, which has caused so much disease in the past, is not required.

EDITORIAL NOTES
 The Canadian Pacific Railway Company expects to complete nearly three hundred miles of new railway in Ontario, exclusive of electric lines. The extension of the Guelph Junction railway west to Goderich is receiving much attention and hundreds of men are working on it. The line is being built along the line the progress seems show, especially at the spring readings and cuts, but the line will soon be ready for the rails, twenty car-loads of which are already on their way to Guelph. Next spring will undoubtedly see this line in operation.

The branch of the C. P. R. to Stratford and Listowel, via Wellesley and Linwood villages, is apparently intended for construction next year instead of this. With the exception of the cities of Stratford and Guelph all the places interested in this road seem desirous that it shall be operated by electricity instead of steam. Guelph apparently favors steam because it will have a tendency to retard the Wellesley extension of the C.P.R. electric road and so bring all the traffic of the Stratford branch over their Guelph Junction railway on which they would receive a percentage payment. Stratford appears to be seeing some sort of "prestige" from having a steam instead of an electric road. It looks at present very doubtful if any bonuses will be obtainable for this road for steam service unless possibly in Stratford where a bylaw is now being prepared in case the city and C. P. R. come to terms, on the return of Mayor Ferguson from his western holiday trip this week.

Meantime the electric extension from Berlin is "making haste slowly." The building of this road to Waterloo town has met with all sorts of delaying obstruction, first from Berlin and later from the G. T. R. The tracks of the road are now, however, laid through Waterloo, and if the present injunctive proceedings are settled in favor of the electric road, there will be no further right-of-way hindrance when the company gets ready to extend on to Wellesley.

Wellesley township council is paying a large amount this year in the item of wire fence bonus. It is money well spent. But the council should go farther and pass a by-law empowering themselves to compel the removal of all fences which obstruct the roads in winter by causing the drifting and accumulating of snow in winter. It is fully as necessary to compel a property owner to remove a fence which impedes public traffic and so cause his neighbor damage and financial loss as to force him to destroy noxious weeds which may spread and cause damage to his neighbor by that means. It is in summer time that the changes can best be made to make the roads good in winter. Do it now.

A few years ago the government ordered a new column to be added in the Ontario voters' lists in order to tell the occupation of the persons whose names appear. This extra column has caused untold annoyance to the printers and is nearly as useful as a matter of information as a fifth wheel would be to a wagon. Sometimes the owner of and resident on a 200-acre farm is put down as "aggrt," sometimes "farmer," and occasionally one is noticed to be a "gentleman." And it is surprising how few seem to belong to this latter class. Several owners of farms are only a "laborer," and occasionally the tenant of a village potato patch is called "far-

mer." But the laughable descriptions under the heading of "occupation" come in Part II, where the lists are recorded. Here is one busily occupied in being a "widow" and a little further down another is found working at the business of an "spinster." None of them are classed as "gentlemen," that being a dignity which no woman has ever yet attained, but the assessors did not seem able to find even one to put in the lists as being classed under the occupation "lady." This newly-added column shows, however, that there is not a "loner," "drunkard," "thief," "gossip," "crank," "match-maker" or "politician" in the township who is entitled to a place in the voters list.

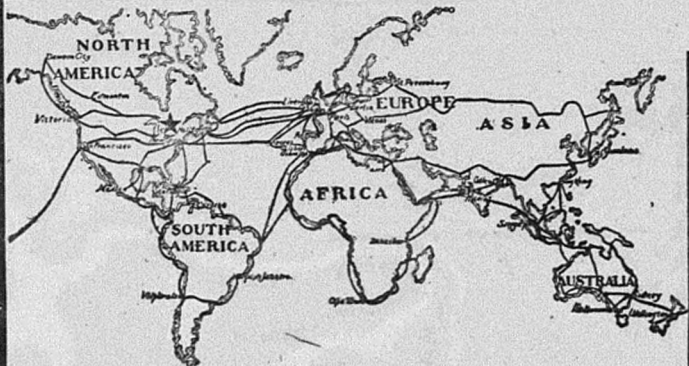
