EDITORIAL NOTES.

Tavistock is still agitating for incorporation. With an assessed value of about \$400,000, that village ought to manage its municipal business without increasing the taxes, especially as it has no bridges or other expensive public works to maintain.

It is a noticeable fact that just after a fire in a small village there is always an agitation for fire protection. It soon dies out, however, until the next blaze. Modern fire engines and hose have now almost reached perfection and the prices are at the lowest point; insurance companies give protected villages big preference in rates; the law allows any village, whether incorporated or not, to raise money by debenture for fire protection and some local improvements. But the "keep down the taxes" hoodoo seems still to cling to the people, who prefer to pay money to the insurance company than to the tax collector.

As has been before stated in these columns the village of Wellesley is happily so situated that it could have water pressure fire protection, to cover the whole village at an outside cost of \$3000. The assessed value of the village is now almost \$300,000 and increasing rapidly. It would thus take a special tax of about 10 cents in the \$100 of assessment for 20 years to pay off the debentures, and the more the assessed value increased the less the tax in the \$ would be. And the gain by reason of lower insurance rates would more than pay the entire tax. And yet the matter is neglected. When the matter is mooted one wiseracre will say: "ye can't git fire protection till we incorporate!" Another replies: "Why not turn us into a police village?" Then along comes the chump with the old familiar remark "The man with the least taxes has the most to say!" and there the matter drowns until recalled by the next fire.

Township councils should rigidly enforce the law requiring traction engines to travel across bridges on special planks which they must carry for the purpose. Bridge floor planking is too expensive these days to be destroyed by corrugated traction wheels.

We've just got word of a country editor who started in business fifteen years ago with a capital of \$300 and retired the other day worth \$100,000. His accumulating of wealth was owing to frugality, strict attention to business and to the fact that an uncle died and left him \$99,800.

The Ontario fruit crop promises to be a poor one this year. Cherries have been noticeably scarce while apples and plums will be away below last year in quantity.

It is reported that Russia will grow much less wheat this year than last. The shortage is quoted at fully one hundred and fifty million bushels. This will undoubtedly have the effect of stiffening prices in the world's great wheat markets.

All the settled parts of Ontario are interested in electric railway service. It is figured that a population of 2000 per mile is essential to success where the line depends upon passenger traffic only, and the Globe says it is not yet decided whether the population follows the electric roads or the roads the people. Twenty years ago there were 36 miles of electric roads in the United States; now there are nearly 25,000, using 68,000 cars and

200,000 horse power, and the net earnings in 1902 were \$102,572,693. Eastern Ontario is rapidly increasing its electric railway mileage while the south part is being fairly networked with these profit earning and accumulating roads.

The immense armies of the Russians and Japanese are now close together and a battle is imminent. As there are more than half a million men in each army the slaughter of human lives is fearful to contemplate should the fight take place while the peace terms are being negotiated.

An acetylene gas explosion in Caldonia village wrecked two stores last Saturday evening while a large number of customers were in. About twenty people were injured, some of them dangerously.

A buggy attempting to cross the railway track at Breslau on Sunday afternoon was run into and one of the occupants, Miss Ida Prong, aged 18, was instantly killed. The two other occupants of the buggy were injured.

Caselo Chadwick, of Cleveland, the "millionaire" who has created a big sensation in the United States courts, has just passed through the bankruptcy court. Her assets amounted to \$25,000 to pay liabilities of \$2,000,000.

A partial eclipse of the moon will occur, which will be visible here, on the evening of August 14th. The eclipse will begin at 9.39 p. m., eastern time, and end at 11.43 p. m. 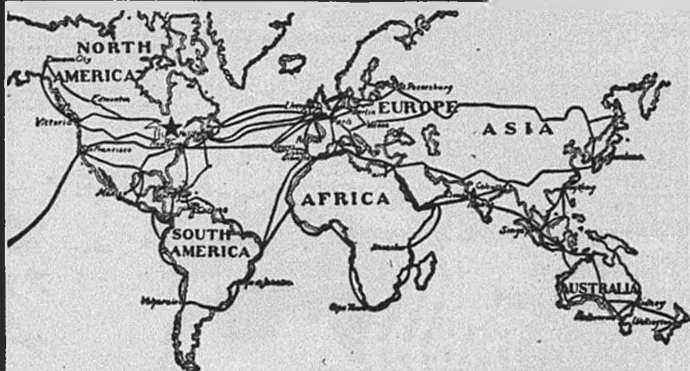
