Another of our old pioneers called away last week in the death called away least week in the deam of Mr. Joseph Eebr, who died last Tuesday evening, July 25th, at the heme of his son-in-law, Mr. Chris. Wagler, at the ripo old age of 87 years, 6 months and 25 days, after a short illness. The funeral was held on Friday forencen and was largely attended. Many came from far and near to pay their last tri-bute of respect to the departed. Bishon Daniel H. Steinmann con ducted the service at the house, after which the remains were taken to the cemetery at the Amish-Monn ouse west of Baden, ite meeting and laid in their last resting place A large concourse of people followed the remains to the grave. After the remains to the grave. After the interment, services were con-ducted in the meeting-house by Bishop Jacob Bender, assisted by several others. Joseph Zehr was born in Lorraine, Germany, Dec. 31st, 1817, and came to Canada with his parents. They resided in Woolwich Township for a few years, then moved to Wilmot, where Mr. Zehr tesided till bis death. His wife to whom he was married in 1646, died in 1900. Thus they had lived together for over half a centers survive to mourn the loss of their father. EDITORIAL NOTES.

Tavistock is still agitating for in corporation. With an assessed val-ue of about \$400,000, that village ought to manage its municipal busi ness without increasing the taxes ospecially as it has no bridges or other expensive public works to maintainAt

It is a noticeable fact that just after a fire in a small village there isalways an agitation for fire pro toction. It soon dies out, however, until the next blaze. Modern fire engines and hose have now almost reached perfection and the prices are at the lowest point; insurance companies give protected villages big preference in rates; the law big preference in rates; the law allows any village, whether incor-porated or not, to raise money by debenture for fire protection and some local improvements. But the "keep down the taxes" hoodoo seems still to cling to the people. who prefer to pay money insurance company than to the tax collector.

As has been before stated in these columns the village of Well-ssley is happily so situated that it could have water pressure fire protection, to cover the whole village at an outside cost of \$3000. The assessed value of the village is now almost \$200,000 and increasing rapidly. It would thus take a special tax of about 10 cents in the \$100 of assessment for 20 years to pay off the debentures, and the more the assessed value increased the less the tax in the \$ would be And the gain by reason of lower insurance rates would more than pay the entire tax. And yet the matter is neglected. When the matter is mootel one wiseacre will matter is mooted one wiscacre will say: "ye can't git fire pertekahin till we incopperit!" Another re-plies: "Why not turn us into a police village?" Then along comes the chump with the old familiar remark "The man with the least taxes has the most to say!" and there the matter dro's until recalled by the next fire.

Township councils should rigidly enforce the law requiring traction engines to travel across bridges on special plants which they must carry for the purpose. Bridge floor planking is too expensive these days to be destroyed by corrugated traction whoels traction wheels.

We've just got word of a country editor who started in business fif-teen years ago with a capital of \$200 and refired the other day worth \$100,000. His accumulating of wealth was owing to frugality, strict attention to business and to the fact that an uncle died and left him \$99.800.

Twenty years ago there were 85 miles of electric roads in the United States: new there are nearly 25,000, using 88,000 cars and 172 Fifth Am., Cor. 226 St., New York are interested in electric railway service. It is figured that a popu-


