Wilmot Tp. Council met at the Tp. Hall, Baden, on the 21st day of August, 1905. Members all present the Reeve presiding. The minutes of previous session were read and confirmed. The correspondence having been read and ordered to be filed. It was moved by J. T. Otto, seconded by C. Stoesser, that leave be given to the mover to introduce a bylaw to provide for current and expenses and that said bylaw be now read a first and second time.—Carried.

Moved by S. Cassel, seconded by P. Berg, that leave be given to the mover to introduce a bylaw to assess the several school sections in the township for the amounts of their respective levies and that said bylaw be now read a first and second time.—Carried.

Said bylaws were then read a first and second time accordingly. Moved by P. Berg, seconded by S. Cassel, that this Council do now give into committee of the whole on by-laws, do. C. Stoesser in the chair, the blanks in the respective bylaws having been filled and the rate of taxation for the ensuing year having been struck, at five mills or the dollar, the committee rose and the Council resumed, the Reeve in the chair. Moved by C. Stoesser seconded by J. T. Otto, that by-laws numbers 442 and 443 be now read a third time and passed, carried. Read and passed accordingly. Moved by C. Stoesser, seconded by P. Berg, that the following account be passed and that and that the Reeve issue his orders on the Treasurer in payment of same:

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The peace negotiations which it was hoped would end the Japanese-Russian war seem to be unfruitful on account of Russia's stubbornness although Japan appeared willing to make very generous concessions. Should the war go on Russia will have less sympathy than over and if, as seems inevitable, disaster continues to follow her forces the Japs will be justified in demanding the full "pound of flesh" when her opponent becomes finally exhausted. The situation at the war front looks anything but favorable for Russia. Gen. Linovitch is confronted by a much larger and better equipped army while his line of retreat in case of defeat leads only to the wilds of Siberia where only annihilation awaits him. If the present peace conference proves abortive active operations will at once be recommenced and over one million men await only the breaking up of the rainy season to furnish the world with further reports of unnecessary human slaughter.

Late news as this page goes to press indicates that peace has been arranged.

Those Conservatives who were claiming that Lieut. Governor Clark was merely a Party puppet and had no backbone are finding out that he can show a stout resistance when he thinks the occasion demands it. He has issued his ukase that when dismissals from office are made by the new governments for offensive partisanship affidavits proving the charge must invariably accompany the dismissal before he will give it his official sanction. As it is seldom possible to get sworn evidence in such cases many of these offending office-holders will thus be able to thank the Lieut. Governor for a year or two more of the spoils of office.

The power line from Niagara to London has been surveyed. It leads through Stratford via Tavistock and many in the latter village thought they were getting a new electric railway from some unknown place.

Carnegie and Hockseller are wearing themselves into early graves in the heartbreaking effort to give away their wealth. Building libraries and making church contributions will not accomplish it. There is only one way: Start a country newspaper.

A teacher was once explaining to his pupils that "the eyes are for seeing, the nose for smelling, the feet for running," etc. when a little fellow spoke up "then I must be made wrong, for my nose runs and my feet smell."

There are 287 municipalities in the Province of Ontario, not counting Tavistock.

By careful and economical stealing he next to about \$300,000 of the bank's cash when he took his summer holidays. When the bank missed him and their money they put the police to work. Galley had chartered a large yacht and sailed away on August 9th and after a sumptuous voyage he arrived at Buenos Ayres (South America) last week and anchored in—the arms of the police.

Berlin, Stratford, Galt, Woodstock and some other similar towns in Ontario are finding out that their fall show is not a success, and some of these places have decided to discontinue them.

STRATFORD HORSE SHOW.

The Horse Show at Stratford on the 19th, 20th and 21st of September promises to be one of the greatest events in the history of Stratford. The citizens seem to be united in their efforts to have as great a show as possible.

The prize list which has been published covers over \$2000 in prizes besides valuable cups presented by the manufacturers of Stratford and the chartered banks.

The Hon. J. P. Whitney, Premier of Ontario is to open the show on the first day. The government having examined the prize list and investigated the conditions of the show have made a grant toward it of \$200.
