## WELLESLEY COUNCIL.

The Municipal Council of the Township of Wellesley met, pursuant to adjournment, on Monday the 4th day of September, 1906, at 10 o'clock, a.m. All members were present, the reeve in the chair. The minutes of the August session were read, found correct and adopted.

### EDITORIAL NOTES.

Seaforth football club complains that the All-England Pilgrims now touring Ontario are trying to "evade" them. That's it. When the visitors were arranging their American trip the only thorn in their flesh was the fear that they might be beaten by Seaforth!

The hint given in last week's "Leaf" that a telephone line to Crosshill would be profitable has set some farmers thinking that a line taking in a circuit from Wellesley north to Crosshill and back by a loop to the west and south would be an excellent route to test the benefit of a rural telephone line. The benefit of such a service is readily seen and it only requires a gathering of farmers and others interested to propound a scheme for its accomplishment. The mode of procedure and the cost of construction are easily obtainable and there is no reason why this township should not be as forward in the matter as other parts of the county.

Information has leaked out, presumably from a pretty high source, that the C. P. R. does not intend to accept the propositions as recently made in the bonuses voted on by Berlin, Waterloo and the Wellesley section before the charter was taken over by the C. P. R. What the difficulty is does not appear, but any other proposal which has behind it the assurance that the road will mature will be seriously considered in this section where the need of railroad connection is so strongly felt. We are told a survey from Waterloo to Wellesley will shortly be made, upon which survey an estimate of the cost and the proposal of the C. P. R. can be based. Of course if Stratford reaches a solution which assures the building of that branch next summer the anxiety here will be abated although there is an undercurrent of sentiment in favor of an outlet via the Berlin-Proton electric route. If, however, the Grand Trunk Company considered a proposal to open a short line from Baden to Wellesley their scheme would be as warmly supported, as any other, and perhaps be better for the community, as the Guelph-Goderich extension is near enough to give a reasonable competition. It seems to be a case of "first come, first served," so long as an equitable outlet to the seaboard is supplied for our produce. Wellesley section should reorganize its railway committee to be ready for whatever turns up.

The "fall fair" season is now on. Its original intention was to serve as a spur to the farmers to improve their stock and their methods of farming by bringing their produce together for inspection and the encouragement that competition always gives. This spurring up of the farmers if not so much needed in these days when the keenness of the demand for good produce is sufficient of itself to urge the farmer to do his very best for the sake of the money there is in it for himself. Railroads, newspapers, telegraphs and better country roads have brought the big markets wonderfully nearer to the farmer of late years and the competition of prices sharpens the farmer up to his greatest efforts without the encouragement of a fall fair. These fairs still have their uses, however, and it would be a great mistake to withhold from them Provincial support. They serve as an annual meeting place for those whose mission is to help feed a nation: whose aims are of, and whose foregathering tends to unite them in their

efforts. But the methods of management of the really beneficial and successful country fairs have changed so materially that it is doubtful if the older directors have kept in touch with the need of these modern times, so that the rat fallen into by long custom is harmful rather than conducive to the success of the modern country fall show.
