LETTER FROM WINNIPEG.

Written for the Maple Leaf.

Harvesting is over and threshing is now in full swing throughout Manitoba and the great West. In almost in every section of the country the yield comes up to what had been expected and in many cases far above that. The ideal weather at the present time is a great help to the farmers during this busy season.

One of the most beautiful scenes Western Canada is the thousands of acres of golden grain waving in the bright rays of the sun. To those who have never seen this it is well worth while to visit some of the fertile district out here.

The T. Eaton Co. are compelled to add another story to their large five story building in order to gain more room. This firm only commenced business here a few months ago, employing then about 500 people; to-day they have over 1000 employees and are advertising for more.

The number of building permits issued in this city during the year has been in the neighborhood of 3000. This gives the reader a faint idea of growth in Winnipeg.

The famous Irish Guards Band gave four concerts here to large audiences. They are a splendid organization.

The G. T. P. and the C. N. Railroad companies are considering the erection of a magnificent union depot on Main St. at a cost of more than \$2,000,000. This would be a credit to the city.

Wild animals are still to be found in this part of the country. The other day a wild cat was shot on one of the streets almost in the center of the city.

In closing my letter I will give 'Leaf' readers some interesting figures about Winnipeg: It has over 1200 miles of streets; 55 miles of Macadam pavement; 25 miles of asphalt pavement; 235 miles of sidewalk; 34 miles of sewers; 30 miles of street railway; 60 miles of boulevard; 12 beautiful parks; 75 churches; 8 colleges. The municipal expenditure for 1904 was \$1,997,216; building permits in 1904 amounted to \$9,651,750. The rate of taxation for 1904 was 17 mills in the \$.

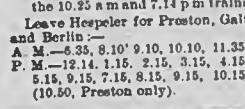
