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EDITORIAL NOTES.

Some one has suggested that the Library Board hold a "Made-in-Wellesley" exhibition. A display of this kind would bring out a much wider range of manufacture than is generally supposed. It would tax the capacity of our largest building and be a very attractive show. The idea is well worth considering, not only for the purpose of advertising the village but for the bringing together of the varied and excellent products of Wellesley's thrift and energy. As a business venture our Library Board is capable of making a "Made-in-Wellesley" exhibition very profitable.

The manufacture of cement is bound to become one of Canada's most substantial industries. It is being consumed in larger quantities every year, and the demand is growing in proportion as its utility and economy for all kinds of permanent structures is becoming better established. The number of houses built with cement this year all over the Dominion is astonishing, while bridges, piers, floors, culverts, etc., are made of scarcely anything else these days.

At the Wellesley council meeting on Monday great interest was taken by a large gathering of ratepayers in the council's action upon what is known as the Brenner drain petition. There is a stretch of swamp land several miles in length lying in the western part of the township between the 7th and 11th lines with its natural fall in Mornington. Many of those owning this low land are extremely anxious to have it drained, and efforts in this direction have several times been made in the past. The cost for digging the drain would not fall far short of \$4,000. This summer the township's engineer was put on under the Act, the whole matter culminating when the petition came before the council on Monday. The principal objection to the scheme appeared to come from some of the property owners along the borders of the swamp who were assessed by the engineer for the building of the drain and who would not be benefited further than that their farms naturally drain into the swamp. The council listened to the well-put arguments on both sides of the question and then left the petition open for an hour or two to allow qualified names to be added to or withdrawn, when it was found that the petition lacked two names of the number required by law, so it was thrown out. The promoters of the drain took their defeat good-naturedly, but it was stated after the meeting that they will come back to the council soon with a much stronger petition than ever.

The assessed value of Wellesley township for 1905 is \$2,872,158, an increase over last year of only \$70,368. The addition of the income and business taxes, and the increases of village assessment led many to think the township would reach the three million mark this year.
