EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Toronto Exhibition people believe in advertising. The date of the 1906 big show is already announced—Aug. 27 to Sept. 10.

Japan has semi-officially acknowledged that her main reason for accepting such easy peace terms was the fact that further war expenditure would be a heavy burden upon a people with a crop failure in prospect, and that the prestige gained and the permanent check given Russia in the East were sufficient recompense.

Advertising is a queer commodity. Millions are spent in advertising every year in Canada without any positive actual guarantee that the money will ever return. Yet the shrewd, enterprising, modern business man scarcely dares to attempt getting along without it. That it is his greatest help in drawing custom he knows, but it is seldom that he can point directly to the particular buyer it has brought to his business place. For instance: a year or so ago Reimer Bros. & Co. decided to sell the balance of their last season's shoes at cut prices to turn them into cash. They advertised the special sale and in two days over 300 pairs were sold, and yet scarcely a customer said it was the advertisement that brought them to the store. But it is to the buyers that the advertisements are of the greatest benefit for he can, through reading them, often save valuable time by knowing just where to go for what he needs to buy. It pays to read the advertisements in your local paper; and it pays to tell the business man that you did so, for by so doing you are sure to please him. Every person should remember that a pleased business man is more profitable to the buyer than a pleased buyer is to the business man.

The Berlin beet sugar factory is looking forward to a big season's work. The acreage is larger than ever and the yield appears to become an exceptionally fine one.

The elections of Ontario seem as determined as ever to stamp out corruption. The feeling which prompted so many Reformers in the late election is now cropping up among Conservatives, who are not slow these days to publicly denounce every act of Mr. Whitney's government which shows the faintest appearance of jobbery. This state of affairs may be a source of consternation to implacable partisans, but it is a good, healthy sign in Provincial politics when the rank and file of both Parties spell Parity with a big P.

While Stratford, Berlin, Guelph, Galt and Brantford have made big jumps forward in population the past year, Woodstock has dropped a hundred or two backward. This is hard to account for in view of the favored location and bustling spirit of Oxford's county town.

Postmaster-General Muloch has resigned his portfolio. It is said he will be succeeded by Mr. Aylesworth.
