EDITORIAL NOTES.

Good morning. Have you paid your taxes?

Berlin had its religious census taken last week, but it still claims to have some senses, and content. Why those ladies did not take the two latter is unexplained.

The Stratford Herald still retains Col. Sellers in the editorial chair. Last Friday, in a two-col. "mark twin" scare-head article the Herald announced that Wellesley village is to be entirely cut off by the new Stratford-Linwood steam, air line, heavy-haul road. As near as we can make out this "Herald's latest" the road is to run plumb through Hampstead and Nithburg, then cross the Nith river and jump into—Wilmet township (?) for a while then skip Wellesley village altogether by scooting along 400 feet east of the section line and nearly bumping into the cheese factory. Whether the road is to take in Heidelberg and Poole on its mad rush for Linwood it does not say, but this latest Herald route would be as straight as forked lightning, and about as much "in the air." ("400 feet east" of the section line is about two blocks from the center of Wellesley village.)

The Wellesley township tax notices, now in the hands of the rate-payers, are full of surprises to those who simply compare the amount with what they paid last year to decide whether they are higher or lower. But a comparison with the assessment schedule will show that all taxes are based on the same rate in the 6, the school rates, of course, being levied according to the needs of the section. The addition of business tax and income tax has not raised the total assessed value of the township as much as was expected, the farmers having got the best of it in separating the buildings from the land in the assessments.
