**EDITORIAL NOTES.**

Waterloo county is literally flagging the other counties in the race for urban population. Berlin has increased over a thousand; Galt nearly as much; Waterloo over two hundred, while Preston, Hepler, Elmira and ten other places all show big increases.

The Berlin Daily Telegraph has just put in a fine "Duplex" printing press, and is now issuing a well-written, able daily in really modern style.

The C. P. R. has sent their engineer over the road from Waterloo to Linwood by way of St. Clements and Hawkesville. The engineer expressed himself, says the Telegraph, "as being very favorably impressed with the feasibility of a railway line to those northern points."

Under the heading "Brer Green too hard to convince," the Stratford Herald denies that it originated the ridiculous Stratford-Linwood steam route outlined in a Maple Leaf editorial, and lays the blame upon the Berlin News-Record. The Herald says:

"The Maple Leaf gets the Herald's information mixed with that quoted by both local papers from the Berlin News-Record, which is altogether responsible for the '40c steam' story. Nor did the Herald in its own report so much as mention Wilnot township. The plans filed in Berlin, of which the Record speaks, were doubtless made out before the change in route was decided upon.

"The Herald has good grounds for its statement that the route now contemplated does not include Wellesley village, a fact neither welcomed in Stratford or Wellesley, but a fact none the less. The line, as now projected, goes direct to Linwood, and that is exactly what the Herald said in its article referred to. The other report was duly credited to the News-Record."

Now, Berlin News-Record stand up on those 40c feet and defend yourself. You're it!

The latter part of the above extract from the Herald should cause some serious thinking in Wellesley. If "the route now contemplated does not include Wellesley," and if the C.P.R. trolley line runs from Berlin to Linwood via St. Clements, as apparently recommended by the engineer, the chances for this village getting the C. P. R. are not looking the brightest. But the Wellesley section has learned to look with doubting eyes upon these various "winter schemes." Nevertheless there should be a sound local organization to grapple with any emergency.

The draining of the large section of Wellesley township from a point just northwest of Crosshill to the western boundary near the thirteenth line seems now an assured fact. The turning down of the petition by the council last October only spurred on the interested parties to greater efforts so that at the last meeting a strong petition was presented to the Board to be dealt with by the council in December. The ditch will be several miles long and will reclaim many hundred miles of swamp lands.
