EDITORIAL NOTES.

Good morning.—Is your wood pile holding out.

Dominion parliament will not open until March.

There is an underground rumor that the trolley line will be extended from Waterloo to Wellesley this year.

Mr. J. W. Green, proprietor of the Wellesley Maple Leaf, has been appointed Manager of the Berlin branch of the Canadian School of Scientific Salesmanship, and is consequently not giving his personal attention to the management of this paper. But the "Leaf" is coming out as usual every week and there are those who say it is a newsworthy local paper than ever. It's circulation is certainly on the increase and in its columns will always be found all the news that's going, while the job department will always be kept equal to the demands made upon it.

A large number of municipalities in Ontario have adopted local option and there will have to be some scientific stretching of the laws to obtain the daily "booze" as a consequence of the recent vote. Sumptuous laws are always difficult to enforce and no law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors has yet proven satisfactory.

LIBRARY MEETING.

The Annual meeting of the Wellaley Public Library was held in the old school-house on Monday Mr. John Walton presiding and Mr. A. J. Saunders acting as secretary. After reading the minutes of the last annual meeting the Secretary read a statement of the financial condition of the Library which showed: Receipts, for the year, of \$178.79 and an expenditure of \$172.35 leaving a balance on hand of \$6.44.

One hundred and fifteen books amounting to \$94.17 were added during the past year making a total of 1705 volumes in the library, valued at \$187.24. The membership for the year was 124 and 2967 books were issued.

Nominations for directors for the ensuing year were received by the secretary, twelve names being submitted. A ballot was taken with the result that the following gentlemen were declared a board of Directors for the ensuing year: Messrs. H. K. Forler, H. K. Reinert, H. K. E. Ratz, E. K. Reinert, A. H. Mr. Wm. W. Chelorn was appointed auditor by the meeting. The board will hold its first meeting on Friday Jan. 13th at 8 p. m. As the membership fee to the library is only 25c per year it is the duty of the members to be prompt members and procure both interesting and instructive reading.

The annual meeting of the Wellaley Agricultural Society was held at the Wellaley last week. The attendance was not quite up to previous years, but was fully represented. The financial report for the year was presented showing an increase in balance on hand over last year, and was adopted. The election of officers resulted as follows: Pres. H. Koly; Vice-Pres. Honorary Directors: The Wellaley Township Council and Clerk. Auditors: W. B. West, and A. B. Robertson.—Gen. Brinkman, Neo-Treas.

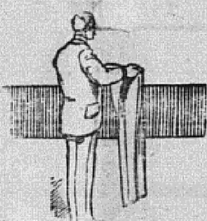


Medical experts are calling the attention of the public to the importance of performing the nose-blowing operation in a scientific and hygienic manner. First one nostril and then the other should be blown without undue violence. Doctors state that the two nasal passages should never be closed at the same time. If they are obstructed, as in the case of a cold, the back of the throat is filled with compressed air, and this, together with the discharge and the microbes which it contains, may be driven through the eustachian tube into the middle ear, and lead to serious results. A great authority on the subject used to forbid his patients to blow their noses when suffering from a cold. This course is hardly one which will commend itself to those in the habit of catching colds. The best advice would seem to be that when it is necessary to blow the nose the blowing should be done gently.—London Daily Mail.

"Public drinking troughs for horses, as they are usually arranged, are a curse, not a kindness," said a veterinary surgeon, for they spread glanders and other diseases. They who leave large sums for costly marble drinking troughs make a great mistake. They should leave the money for a fountain, a spigot—a generous flow of good water, with buckets hung on either side, and no trough. From such a fountain horses would drink fresh water from a separate bucket, rinsed before using. But, the other way, the horse drinks from a trough wherein a hundred noses, no matter how diseased, have previously been dipped. There should be a law against that horse's curse, the public drinking trough."
