EDITORIAL NOTES.

Wellesley is about the only important center in the Province that has not asked the government for a Normal school!

Berlin is negotiating with the McGregor-Gourley Company, of Galt, to remove to the county town. The bonus asked is \$75,000 and it will likely be granted as the firm employs 400 skilled iron workers the year around.

Waterloo county council has about abandoned the permanent roads movement which lately animated them. It is said their intention now is to ask the government to allow the township to decide where the roads shall be built and control the expenditure.

It is reported that one or two Canadian banking institutions have sent to the Old Country for a contingent of young men, to take positions as bank clerks in the Dominion. There are two possible reasons for this: One is the possibility that young Canada has not brains enough to fill the positions. The other reason is that the young men

offer opportunities and remuneration in other commercial occupations that the banks offer them no financial attractions. The latter reason is likely the correct one as Canadians have long ago established a reputation for superior ability which is enjoyed by the youth of no other country on the globe.

The metric system of measuring and weighing is being brought prominently before the people of Canada these days. It reduces all measurements and weights to the decimal system, which is much easier to compute, but the terms employed to describe the amounts would not soon become popular. Just imagine the expression "He stands 6 foot 2 inches in his stockings" described as "He stands 1 myriameter 5 centimetres in his stockings," and when you want to send your little boy for a pound of tea the child would have to ask for 1 myriagramme 4 hectogrammes. Instead of a gallon of coal oil one would require to ask for 8 hectolitres and 3 kilolitres—enough to explode the can. A hundred acre farm is represented by the term 40 hectares. The use of slang might reduce these terms to a term within toleration in a couple of centuries, but the present age is too busy to wrestle with such jaw breakers.

The sudden change from soft, spring-like weather to sharp frosts will tell on the fall wheat crop next years, very likely to the disadvantage of the farmers.

Of course one could, if necessary cook without them, only it would mean going without a score of dishes we think of as everyday necessities, such as custards, cake, puddings, griddle cakes, to say nothing of the abundant use of what we might call purely egg dishes.—From the Delinester for March.

NEWS NOTES.

On Feb. 25th while assisting in special meetings in the Methodist church, Blenheim, Ont., Rev. Dr. Willoughby collapsed in the pulpit. He was about 78 years of age.

Mr. I. S. K. Weber, of Berlin, has bought out the Zinkann interest in the blunderbuss, Zinkann Co. Waterloo, furniture manufacturers. The firm name will continue to be the same. Mr. H. E. Zinkann, formerly manager of the company, Mr. Eph. Zinkann, and Miss Zinkann, withdrew from the firm several weeks ago.

The railways this winter are realizing increased business over last year, owing to the mild weather. The regularity with which they have been running and the fact that there are no snow blockades have meant a great saving in expenditure to both corporations. The C. P. R. expended \$250,000 last year, which is not required this year, and the C. P. R. estimate an increase of 30 per cent. in business over last winter. In the week ending Feb. 10, realized an increase of about \$90,000 over the corresponding week last February.

New York, Feb. 26.—Wireless telegraphy tests are to be made for the next thirty days by the officers in charge of the various stations established by the navy department to determine, if possible, the cause of the many failures to receive and to send messages at sunrise and sunset. Just why the power of the wireless apparatus should be low at ebb of sunsets, or at sunrise, operators say may not be difficult to ascertain; for it has long been known that messages can be sent by the system at night forty per cent better than in the day time. There is what is termed frictional dissipation of energy in transmitting by day. Foggy weather is also more favorable for sending and receiving wireless messages.

At 6.30 o'clock in the morning on Feb. 26, with a mighty roar and a rending sound, the great ice bridge of 1906, at Niagara Falls began to move down the gorge. So sudden was the movement that no time was given to more off any of the shanks and fixtures on the structures and there is no doubt but that a considerable loss will be entailed to the enterprising merchants who had located on the bridge. One of the houses on the bridge was owned by M. Abolbot and used as a photo gallery. When the mass of ice passed under both steel arch bridges the little house was still standing with the American and British flags proudly flying in the face of imminent disaster. The largest shack was that owned by Fred Preston and it is said that it passed down through the rapids in the whirlpool and lower Niagara to Queenston on the big cake of ice that it had been located upon. Two other booths went down with the bridge, and smoke was seen issuing from the chimney of one, which gave rise to a wild rumor that such were on the floating ice. This was happily untrue—Niagara Falls Daily Record.

Miss K. L. Wilks, of Galt, owner of the famous Budie Mac, Katherine L., and probably the most famous horse-woman in America, has presented the Preston Racing Association with a purse and cup, which will make the summer meet at the famous Mineral Springs town the greatest event in the Canadian trotting circuit.

It is probable that the Duke of Argyll, who when Governor General, founded the Command of the Royal Society of Canada, will be present at the celebration of their twenty-fifth Anniversary in Ottawa on May next.

Mr. H. Lang who was born in Berlin 52 years ago and was educated at the St. Jerome's College, met with a fatal accident last week while out shooting along the Mississippi river in Missouri. He was a brother of the Lang Bros., Berlin and had for a number of years lived in Chicago.
