### BERLIN'S ME HIGH SCHOOL The Foremest tachnical Institute in the Province.

The Maple Leaf representative not long ago had occasion to visit the Berlin High School and while there was shown through the iran mense beliding by some of the obliging teachers. The structure has been greatly enlarged of late years and the enterprising Twin City school-thourd has added modern appliances and addict teachers must this school now such as a suppliance and skilled teachers must chief the control of the contro
