EDITORIAL NOTES

Work on the Guelph-Goderich extension of the C. P. R. is pro-gressing steadily. It is expected that the line will be open for traffic from Guelph as far as Elmira by the first of July or August and it is possible that Linwood will be reached before winter in which case the entire line will be completed and trains running on schedule time by the middle of 1907.

Next Monday, at the Wellesley council meeting, the Brenner drain council meeting, the Brener drain petition will again be presented to the Board. The petition is from the owners of a long stretch of swamp lands extending from the Ninth line at the Linwood side line northwesterly to the thirteenth line where it finds an outlet in Moring. ton township. The principal objection to the scheme seems to come from those whose land naturally drains towards this swamp and who will be a seed to help pay for the drain. The promoters of the drain complain that the petition is left open too long at the council meet "antis" have an rings so that the "antis" have an opportunity to influence the signers to take their names off the petition thus leaving it in the minority when it is thrown out by the Board. This has twice occurred at the council meetings, the expen-tive in each instance falling upon the petitioners. Those who are in-terested in having the drain built seem confident that the signers they now have secured to the peti-tion will "stand pat" this time, but there will likely be a lively canvassing time at the meeting next Mon-day if the council leaves the petithe petition open until late in the day as they did on the former occasion.
