Premier Whitney has set all On-Premier Whitney has see an order tario agog by his recent legislation upon the license laws. It was an-ticipated, from his pre-election speeches that he would go no fur-ther at present than to "see that speeches that he would then at present than to "see that the present law was rigidly enforced," so his drastic amendments to d," so his drastic amendments to the Act came as a soft of thunder-bolt. The liquor dealers are, of course, disgusted, especially in rural districts where the license fee is out of proportion to the in come of many of the hotels, and come of many of the hotels, and the shop fees are just about pro-hibitive. In districts like North Waterloo, where moderate drink-ing, especially of beer, is a life-long family custom, Mr. Whitney has made himself anything but popular, while the temperance people all over the Province appear to be grumbling because the Premier, having tuken a step in their direc-tion, did not move farther towards the goal they are so anxious to the goal they are so anxious to reach—Prohibition. If the new Conservative government intended this move as a future vote-catcher they have approached the matter like political apprentices; if their intention is pure, honest, legisla-tion their action reminds one of the proverbial class of people who sh in where angels fear to tread' in dealing so early in their career with a question upon which they had in no wise politically pledged m selve

The Wellesley township ess ment rolls, recently handed in the clerk, show that the total ass ently handed in to ed value of the township is now \$3,-955,977. This is on increase of a million dollars over last year, and about half a million over the amount fixed by the county council.

The Linwood side line, from Macton south to the Seventh conce ion is getting to be in a deplorable condition, and it is no wonder that a deputation waited upon the coun oil last Monday seeking to have the road repaired. This stretch of road has several times been mentioned by the Maple Leaf as the one upon which Wellesley's first experiment in permanent reads should be made. When the Guelph Goderich rail. when the Gusph Goderich rail-road reaches Linwood next year that side road will be greatly used by the township and the roadbed should be thoroughly prepared be-fore gravel is wasted upon it.
