Under the supervision of their teachers the scholars quickly learn that manliness is the true aim. These annual events, too, bring out in the children a spirit of loyalty to their school which develops later on into loyalty to their home, their religion and their country. The school playground has its use in character forming as surely as the school-room and the church.

TRAGEDY AT BALL GAME.

LIGHTNING KILLS FIVE AND INJURES MANY.

Mobile, Ala., May 27.—During a ball game in an open field three miles from this city this afternoon a thunderstorm came upon a company of vivid lightning which struck in the midst of a crowd of spectators, instantly killing five persons and injuring about twenty-five others more or less seriously. The dead—Donald Tovar, aged 21; Steven Tovar, aged 18 years, sons of Steven J. Tovar; Arthur Moody, aged 19; two negroes, John Green

and Charles Thomas, seriously injured.—John Youkers, Fred Johnson.

At least twenty others were shocked and knocked down by the stroke. They quickly recovered and were able to leave the scene. The field was strewn with bits of shoes and clothing from those who were killed or seriously injured, and the bodies of the dead presented a terrible spectacle. A silver dollar from the pockets of one of the victims was melted on both sides.—Globe

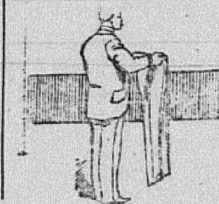
