EDITORIAL NOTES.

Dominion The the bominion government is grinding away right through this hot weather. The making of "Political capital" appears to be the sublime aim on both sides. There is no harm in this, but it comes high, and the country has to pay the shot.

The energetic Public Library Board of Tavistock cleared the handsome sum of \$350 by the big Dominion Day celebration they held on July 2nd. Wellesley is-'dead ripe'' for a celebration. There has been none held here for years and the whole country-side is looking for some one with nerve enough to undertake a big day.

The statute labor season is about over for another year. On the whole the path masters and men have done as well as this style of roadmaking permits. But the lack of permanency is everywhere no-ticeable. In the fields, around the barns and farm houses everything is built to last and be useful all the is built to last and be useful all the time without regard to expense, because the farmer knows that that kind of building, fencing, draining, etc., is the only kind that really pays. But tained on exactly the opposiste principle; scientific drainage and gradg are almost entirely neglected. while the packing of the new grave on the roads is left to the slow on the roads is left to the slow method of being ground down into the dirt by wheels and packed by horses feet—costly to vehicles and harness and cruel to the hardwork ing defenceless animals. There is a man who travels the roads but knows the statute labor system of road making to be as expossive as it is foolish and unsuited to the requirements of the present day, and yet there seems to be no pian which the people are so unwilling to change. The masses who refuse to apopt modern methods of road-building forfeit their right to scoff at the Chinese who cling to their three-thousand-versar-old system of three-thousand-years-old system of plowing with a crooked stick.

"County roads" does not appeal county roads' does not appeal to the rural tax payer who has little or no sympathy with a long stretch of permanent road paid for by peo-ple who do not live along its bor-ders. If the governments million ders. If the governments million dellar fund were available to town-ships instead of county councils, then there would be an inducement to build stretches leading to the nearest market, which is what the farmer wants and is willing to pay for. In a very short time these stretches would join, making continuous permanent roads in all directions. If the townships received this one-third bonus from the government, the statute labor commutation would pay the rest in twenty years so that there would soon be permanent roads all over the country practically at no cost the country practically at no cost to the people. The Maple Last has frequently propounded this scheme and will continue to do so: it "works out on paper," (as one works out on paper." (as one news paper sneeringly said recently) and it will "work out" in fact.
