EDITORIAL NOTES.

It is said that the first train stopped in Linwood just four minutes: from two to two to 2.2 Toot, toot.

The South Wellesley and Linwood railway bonds by laws were published in the Maple Leaf side by side. The rails are now laid to Linwood while the south Wellesley railroad is still a dim vision. The Linwood road was bunned only \$1000 per mile through the township and was very costly to build, while the proposed electric extension from Waterloo is almost as easy as a prairie section and was bunned \$3000 per mile. Oh, Mr. Leonard, how could you!

Under the statute labor system the average farmer puts in eight days work gravelling and grading the road; then it costs him about \$8 more in extra wear and tear of rigs, harness and horses to boat the track down to a shape fit to travel on!

Toronto's league base ball club is certainly "in on the ground floor" this season.

The annual crop of municipal voters' lists will soon be harvested. There are several people who do not yet understand just why those

in the lists. The actual reason is really as clear as mud. Then the "occupation" column has also mystified some. This classification has been in the list for the past five or six years. It draws a clear distinction between the "farmer," the "laborer" and the "gentleman." Time was when a farmer could legally be all three of those things. But it is in Part II—the ladies' department—that this new-fangled "occupation" column makes it clear as to what the fair sex put in their time working at. "Widow," "spinster," etc. is what the law now says they are doing, but so far it does not compel them to tell how they like the job. If the Legislature keeps tinkering with the municipal Act they will finally get the voters' lists into fairly comprehensible shape.

This part of Ontario is now long enough coupled to permit of the holding of township Old Settler's Re-unions. Taking the form of picnics these gatherings would do much toward cementing old friendships, while the recounting of early reminiscences would preserve in the minds of the young the quaint history of the lives of their pioneer ancestors which is rapidly being lost and forgotten.

BY-LAW NO. 578.

To Restrain and Regulate the Running at Large of Animals on the Public Highways, Streets and Commons of the Township of Wellesley, and for Other Purposes.

WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient and necessary to pass a by-law to restrain and regulate the running at large of animals on the Public Highways, Streets and Commons of the said Township of Wellesley;

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Corporation of the Township of Wellesley, by the Municipal Council thereof in Council duly convened and assembled, and it is hereby enacted as follows, viz:

1. That except as provided in the next succeeding section of this by-law, no Horse, Bull, Steer, Ox, Cow, Heifer, Sheep, Goat, Pig, Goose, Cattle or Poultry, shall be allowed to run at large on any of the public Highways, Streets, or Commons within the limits of the Municipality of the Township of Wellesley.

2. That in the day time between the hours of 6 o'clock a. m. and 8 o'clock p. m. from the 15th day of May to the 1st day of November (both days inclusive) in each year, Cows, Steers, Oxen, and Heifers, may be and remain on the Public Highways, Streets, and Commons aforesaid if herded by a competent person.

3. Any Horse, Bull, Steer, Ox, Cow, Heifer, Sheep, Goat, Pig, Goose, Cattle or Poultry, found running at large contrary to the provisions of this By-Law, may be impounded by any person or persons, and the owner or owners thereof shall be subject to the costs, charges and penalties set forth as follows, viz: For a Horse, of Twenty-five cents each; and the sum of Ten Cents each for all kinds of Poultry, over and above the pound keeper's fees. All fines and costs, etc., to be collected in like manner and in accord with By-Law 363.

4. That the above mentioned fines may be imposed without impounding any such animal or animals, in conformity with Section Number Four of By-Law 363.

That this By-Law shall take effect and come in force immediately after the final passing thereof. Passed at the Council Chamber at Crowshill in the Township of Wellesley this fourth day of June, 1900.

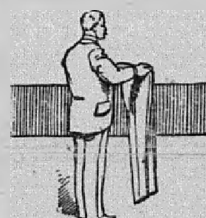

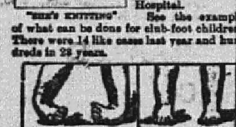

THE picture shown is one dear to every man, woman, boy and girl, on account of its meaning—"The Victoria Cross," given for conspicuous bravery. If only the soil of South Africa could voice the deeds performed upon it, how many Victoria Crosses would have been found to have been earned by Canada's sons! It is hard in the heat of action to notice every act of valor, and therefore only those which take place under the eye of superiors of sufficient rank can be noted. The picture shows one of such deeds. Two troopers are closely pressed by the enemy. The horse of one is hit. Under the withering fire, the man whose mount is unharnessed halts, and, risking everything, waits to get his comrade safely mounted behind him and carry him back to the Canadian lines. It is a desperate deed, and one often performed but seldom noticed. Hence, however, such an act is seen, the reward dear to soldiers' hearts above every other is the result.
